Chief Glore has compiled a little booklet on the subject of fire precautions and alds to victims. Some of his suggestions follow:

Don't-Allow rubbish to accumulate in closets and unused rooms.

Fill lamps when they are burning. after dark or near an open fire. Run stovepipes through wooden par-

Put up gas brackets so that they may swing against woodwork or lace cur-

tains Put ashes in wooden receptacles. Take an open light to examine a gas

Forget to have pails of water handy in case of fire. With these few "don'ts" carefully observed, Chief Glore is confident that the ordinary householder will have few

Health Commissioner, With Bigger Force Than Ever, Is Unable to Keen City Sanitary.

HIMSELF HELPLESS

Dr. M. R. Stewart, health commissioner, confesses his inability to take care of the garbage in the city and check the spread of contagious and infectious diseases in a communication sent to the council yesterday which will be read Monday night. He makes an urgent call for help on all sides. From all appearances he wants more garbage wagons, more assistant health commissioners and more office help. If there is anything Dr. Stewart does not want to conduct the health department some of the councilmen want to know what

STEWART CONFESSES

The garbage problem has been Dr Stewart's undoing. The stack of pink slips on which complaints are kept are knee deep about the office. The councli put on an additional five teams about two months ago, but this did not seem to relieve the situation. With these additional teams the garbage de partment is not hauling any more rub-bish than it did before the extra teams were put on, the routes divided up and made smaller. Dr. Stewart wants sev-eral additional teams, but says be

cannot get them because teams are in demand at \$5.50 a day. In his monthly health report it shows that the spread of contagious and infectious diseases has not been checked. The epidemic of smallpox is on the increase, there being 55 cases this month as compared to 37 last month. There were 76 cases of scarlet fever and 17

cases of diphtheria. The death rate was slightly lower last month than for the same month a year ago. There were 90 deaths last year ago. There were 90 deaths last month as compared with 102 deaths in May a year ago. Of these 57 were mailes and 33 females. During the month there were 134 marriage licenses. The provision inspector only condemned 210 pounds of food and made no prosecutions.

ment Hall Last Night to Discuss The Proposition.

A number of leading citizens of the Third municipal ward met last evening in the Seventeenth ward amusement hall, for the purpose of discussing, in an informal way, the question of placing an Independent Citizens' ticket in the field next fall. There was a fair representation of the voting districts. and representatives of the First and Second precincts were present and told of the work so far done in those parts of the city. The sentiment, as ex-pressed by all present was enthusiastic-ally in favor of a Citizens' ticket, provided it should express a popular choice of candidates and be entirely independent of all party machines. In the opinion of the speakers there was no doubt that such a ticket could be elected, and that, it was thought, would mean, not only a capable, honest, busi-ness administration, but peace in local politics and the restoration of n conditions which had been disturbed by peculiar conditions.
