State Labor Convention.

HARRISBURG, Pa., 10.—Thirty

delegates were present at the State

Labor Convention, Thos. W. Spar-

row, president. The resolutions de-

mand the abolition of the national

banking system, repeal of the

specie resumption act, and the

issue of currency based upon the

wealth of the whole nation; declare

eight hours a day's work; demand

the sanitary inspection of all con-

ditions of labor; a tariff for the

protection of American industries;

bureau of labor statistics; equaliza-

tion of taxes; abolition of the con-

tract system; prohibition of the

employment of prison labor; leg-

islation compelling employers to

pay for injuries to employees; that

public lands be reserved for actual

settlement; arbitration for the

settlement of disputes between

capital and labor; compulsory

education; and the employment

of children under fourteen in

industrial establishments; call for

the abolition of all companies

which are not for the benefit of

educational institutions; and recom-

mend the principle of co-operation,

distributive and productive.
