LOCAL BRIEFS.

Funeral Services Today—Funeral services for the remains of the late John Long are being conducted this afternoon in the Ninth ward meeting-house. The services began at 2 o'clock.

Signed Contract—Mayor Thompson returned to the city Saturday afternoon from his trip to Denver and at once signed the contracts with P. J. Moran for the four big street paving jobs.

Painfully Injured—Samuel Johnson, a carpenter who resides at 650 South Thirtieth West street, is at the D. S. hospital suffering from a badly fractured thigh, caused by a fall from a scaffold on which he was working.

Excursion Aug. 7—The Macabees have decided to have their annual excursion this year on Aug. 7, and the place selected is Salt Lake. Committees are now making arrangements for the outing, and all the tents and hives in the state are expected to take part.

Hayes Funeral—Funeral services for the remains of John C. Hayes, who threw himself in front of a U. S. Grand switch engine and died shortly afterwards, were held at Castle hall yesterday, the Order of Eagles officiating. There was a large turnout of relatives and friends.

Perkins Fined \$30—A. N. Perkins was fined \$30 in the juvenile court on Saturday for receiving stolen brass from three boys who were up before the court for stealing the brass from a Short Line car. The boys were released at 114 South Sixth street. The court remitted \$25 of the fine and Perkins paid the remainder.

May Not Prosecute—It is likely that the charge of causing a riot, leveled against Saxon Williams in Judge Diehl's court, will not be prosecuted. THE PHILOSOPHY OF MATCH-MAKING

Not the Matrimonial, But the Scientific Union of Oxygen and Carbon.

THE KITCHEN STOVE DID IT.

The Professor's Advice to Unmarried Men and How Great a Matter a Little Fire Kindled.

When Prof. Cummings announced to the nature study class on Saturday at the university that the subject for the day's lesson would be match-making, the male members of the class, most of whom are bachelors, suddenly became unusually attentive, while most of the lady members were visibly affected. When he went on to say that the lesson would treat also of the kitchen stove and of fire making, the young men had a frightened and apprehensive expression, until the professor reassured them by remarking that he was not going to teach them how to make kitchen fires, for he would advise the unmarried men not to learn that art. What the professor then proceeded to do was almost as interesting as what the students seemed to wish that he was going to do. He placed some wood, some sulphur, and a bit of phosphorus on a tin plate and held it over a flame. The phosphorus immediately blazed forth with a dazzling light; later the sulphur slowly and unwillingly burned in blue flame, and finally the wood ignited. Then the professor explained how match-making is made, and each youth and maid dreamily looked into the air, no doubt reflecting how strange it is that the vast energies which are hidden in air and fuel, may burst into blaze when set going by a mere spark, just as the tremendous consequences of love, courtship, and matrimony, all lie hidden in the innocent smile of youth, and the least spark of passion kindled. As the members of the class came back to earth, they learned that the air contains that tremendously powerful agent of combustion, oxygen, in such quantity that the whole globe could easily be burnt up in a flash and that once ignited, and yet this awful power is so nicely and safely adjusted and locked up by infinite wisdom that it does not escape the control of the sleeping infant. The teacher proceeded to describe and illustrate the things done for man by the tireless agent we call heat.

WHAT HEAT WILL DO.

(1) It makes some substances expand. (2) It decomposes others. (3) It causes some substances to volatilize or evaporate. (4) It cooks certain foods. (5) It hardens some substances; (6) softens others; (7) changes the colors of some. (8) Purifies others. (9) melts, makes porous, makes solid. Most of the lessons on heat may be taught in all grades of school, but the nature of heat is best explained in the higher grades, and should not go lower than the eighth. Heat is energy—a form of motion, the motion being among the molecules of which all material substances are composed. The molecules are widely separated relatively as far apart as the planets are, according to some scientists. The molecules are in motion; they move slowly in cold substances, rapidly in hot ones, the degree of heat thus depending upon the rapidity of motion and the length of the orbit (amplitude) of the vibration of each molecule. This fact explains why the copper wire does not get heated all at once when the lamp flame is placed at one end of it. The wave motion of the first molecule is gradually imparted to the nearest, and from these to others, until distant. As the wave motion grows longer, the molecules get so far apart that their hold upon or attraction for each other is diminished, and the molecules become more free. The greater the vibration, the molecules get entirely apart and we have a gas.

SOURCES OF HEAT.

Heat is produced by combustion, friction, percussion, compression, electricity, chemical action, etc. In ordinary combustion, the oxygen of the air combines with the carbon in the fuel. These two substances will not unite at ordinary temperatures. They must be heated up to what is called the kindling point, and then their molecules run together, producing a flash that intensifies the wave motion and increases the heat. Other substances have a greater and others a lesser affinity for oxygen than carbon does. Thus, phosphorus unites with oxygen at 100 degrees F., and hence must be kept away from the ordinary air, by being covered with water. Sulphur unites with oxygen at about twice that temperature. The kindling or igniting point of wood is still higher, and of coal higher yet. Smoke is unconsumed coal. There are perhaps 100 tons of coal always hanging in the air over the city of London, and a proportionate amount over Salt Lake City.

SCIENTIFIC HARMONICS.

That all nature is one vast thought-system held together by the power of love, or some other subtle attraction, was the plain inference from the lesson. That friction produces heat is seen in rubbing hands together to warm them, in heated axles, etc.; that percussion does so is seen in hammering a nail or in striking a hammer. That compression has the same result is seen in the bicycle pump; that electricity produces heat is discovered by touching the electric lamps; and that chemical action does so is shown by pouring sulphuric acid into water, when the substance heat as they mingle, and in the smoking of gunpowder and dynamite. At this point the bell rang, and one member proposed that they all visit the circus together. And as they left the great hall on which the university stands, and looked out upon the beautiful valley, bathed in sunshine and gleaming in many colors through the transparent atmosphere, the distant and rugged mountains smoothed by the distance into softness, the youths and maidens seemed to pair off as they went down the hill, and the professor, being directly after them, sighed in an undertone. "Behold how great a matter a little fire kindled!"
