

## BIG DAMAGE SUIT.

Sugar King Sprinkles and Associates Ask for Two and a Half Millions Dollars.

A suit against two companies was filed in the county court's office, Tooele, today, by the San Francisco Chronicle, H. A. W. Dowd and Co., against the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company, C. C. Sherwood, J. D. Stevens, A. H. Sprinkles, W. D. R. Gilson, M. H. Webb, F. N. Lohman and Meyer Horwitz. The suit is for non-paying in return shares of stock, and all kinds of losses, a mortgage debt and for damages.

The complainant charges that C. A. Sprinkles is the owner of 3,000 shares in the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company, which he gave up in the name of H. A. W. Dowd and Co. in the name of H. A. Dowd. Retiring shareholders have made a demand to have the stock taken care of three shares passed to H. A. Dowd, but alleged that they are irretrievably lost. The company has refused to make arrangements.

The complainant states that on May 26, 1893, the defendant company, H. A. W. Dowd and Co., filed a suit in the county court to quiet title to one-half acre of land situated on the property of the company, extending eastward from the railroad tracks in the name of H. A. Dowd. Retiring shareholders have made a demand to have the stock taken care of three shares passed to H. A. Dowd, but alleged that they are irretrievably lost. The company has refused to make arrangements.

Claim Sprinkles, however, says, was still left in control of more than two-thirds of the entire issue. The complainant charged that no meeting of stockholders was ever held during the time of his control, and that the result of the passing of the stock was the result of the passing of the majority of the capital stock, stated, as required by law.

The claim is also made that in connection with the transfer of the stock, the defendant company, H. A. W. Dowd and Co., did not pay any money or dividends, nor was any sum collected from the company.

The affairs, dealing, and business of the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company are set forth in the complaint, which states that the company has always been solvent and that in October 1, 1892, its assets amounted to \$1,400,000, consisting of real estate worth \$770,000, bonds and stocks valued at \$100,000, furniture and fixtures valued at \$41,000, lighting and heating, storage, values at \$30,000, buildings and improvements, value \$20,000, steam power, value \$20,000, and buildings valued at \$10,000, as well as other assets as the following amount: Capital, \$1,000,000; Mandrake, \$300,000; fencing valued at \$50,000; the Pine Tree reservoir, value \$17,000; the Hotel, mill, water power, Kauai reservoir, \$20,000; Wahine reservoir, \$21,000; the railway, value \$10,000; and the water reservoir, \$6,000; cash on hand in the company's San Francisco office, \$600; merchandise, \$10,000; cash on deposit with W. H. Irwin & Co., New York, \$17,000; cash on deposit with the Bank of California office account amounting to \$100,000; the plantation account amounting to \$440,700.70.

As opposed to this formidable list of assets it is stated that the total outstanding debts of the company at that date did not exceed \$100,000. It is from this showing that the plaintiffs argue that it was unnecessary to make the issue of bonds which they now question.

The plaintiffs ask for an injunction restraining the defendants or the bondholders from taking any proceedings until a complete accounting has been had of the affairs of the corporation. The court is also asked to decree a trial by a jury. A. H. Sprinkles, the son in the same name of C. A. Sprinkles, and H. A. Dowd. The plaintiffs also say that C. A. Sprinkles, John D. Stevens and A. H. Sprinkles are compelled to pay \$2,000,000 in plaintiff's damages.
