LOCAL BRIEFS.

Doctor Will Investigate—Dr. H. J. Fredericks, of the state board of health, will investigate cases of glanders said to exist among horses in the neighborhood of Logan.

Funeral of Miss Richards—Funeral services over the remains of Miss Alice Richards, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Stephen Richards, will be held from the family residence, Sunday at 4 o'clock p.m.

Go On Vacation—Miss Rosalie Pollock, primary supervisor in the city schools, left last evening for Minneapolis, Minn., and Fargo, N.D., to spend her vacation. She will be gone until the latter part of August.

Contempt Proceedings—The contempt proceedings against Saxon D. Williams for failure to pay his divorced wife, Grace Williams alimony as ordered by the court was continued yesterday afternoon by Judge Morse until next Friday.

Mus Pay Alimony—Judge Morse yesterday afternoon ordered Richard Gough to pay his wife, Martha Gough, \$10 per month alimony during the pendency of the divorce proceedings filed by Mrs. Gough and also to pay her attorneys \$50 for their services.

Big Day at Saltair—Real estate men's day at Saltair, June 28, is expected to be a record breaker in the way of attendance. Prices will be given away to the amount of \$5,000. The committee in charge of the excursion met last evening to perfect plans for the outing.

Morris Family Reunion—The annual reunion of the Morris family with their old home at Calder's on the afternoon of Saturday, June 30. The families of Elias, Richard V., William Hugh and Barbara will participate in the celebration. The date selected is the anniversary of the late Elias Morris.

Reception for Pratt—C. O. Pratt, who has been in Salt Lake for some time in the interests of the Street Railway Men's union, will be the recipient tonight of honors at the hands of members of the local union. The event will take place at the association's hall, 21 west First South. Mr. Pratt departs shortly for the east.

Mrs. Pugsley Ill—The serious illness of Mrs. Martha Pugsley is announced. The lady, who is well advanced in years, is suffering from nervous trouble, and doubts of her recovery are entertained. She is the widow of the late Phillip Pugsley and mother to Mrs. Ezra Thompson and Mrs. S. M. Barlow. Mayor Thompson, who is out of the city, has summoned home.

Strawberry Festival—A strawberry festival was held last evening by the Willing Workers' society of the First Baptist church, at the residence of Mrs. Dolly Southard, 35 west Fifth South street, about 100 people being in attendance. The society had pledged itself to raise \$100 towards the purchase of a building lot, and that sum was realized by last evening's entertainment.

Republican Meeting—The Republican county committee met last evening at the court room of Judge G. G. Armstrong, when the list of registrars for the ensuing election was submitted from the chairman of the various city districts. The county districts will be provided for at a meeting this afternoon. At the meeting last night Col. M. M. Kaign and Maj. H. P. Myton made speeches.

Realty Transfer—Reuben E. Miller has purchased from L. W. Wadsworth lot 1, block 52, plus A, situated on Fourth South between Main and State streets, for \$10,512.50. A piece of ground 5x7½ rods, corner Third and J streets, has been sold by M. S. Wooley to R. C. Jones, the consideration being \$3,500. The same dealer transferred to O. D. Romney, 10x15 rods on Tenth and J streets, for \$1,750.

Vall's Sale Blocked—The sale of a horse by Chief Vall of the fire department to the police department of the city for \$225, which was authorized by the city council on Monday night was blocked in the head yesterday by the referee of City Marshal Alf to issue a warrant to Chief Vall for violation of the deal. The referee claims that the law forbids a city official from selling supplies of property of any character to the city, hence Chief Vall was compelled to take back the horse.

Sullivan Fired \$50—Daniel E. Sullivan, a miner from Eureka, was fined \$50 by Judge C. H. Dichter yesterday afternoon, for having the previous evening carried away a box containing silver-mounted glassware, the property of J. S. Jensen & Son. The court remarked that the parents of the man would be informed of his conduct and investigation made as to his mental condition, as the defendant seemed to be dazed, either from the continued use of intoxicants or from a weak mind.

French Woman Missing—Diligent search is being made throughout the country for Mrs. M. Barber, a French lady who has been missing for seven weeks, much to the sorrow of her brother, Eugene Delteil and his son, Eugene. They are now in Denver, looking for their relative. Mrs. Barber left French Village, Ill., to come to Utah, where she said she formerly lived and owned property. On May 2 she left St. Louis for Denver and arrived safely at the latter place, but since that time no trace of her has been found. She had \$1,000 in cash with her when last seen by her friends. She is described as being about five feet tall, feeble and speaking a strong foreign accent. One limb is shorter than the other, causing her to walk with a limp.
