r WASHINGTON, 12.—The Secretay of the Navy has concluded his examination of the survivors of the Polaris, and has commenced the preparation of his report. It will be finished in a few days, and with the evidence of Captains Tyson and Myers, the Esquimaux Joe and Hans, and several of the crew, it will be given to the public. The result of the investigation will show, first, that Captain Hall died a natural death; second, that the party war old in lows, is of roan color, seven tural death; second, that the parting from the *Polaris* by Captain Tyson and his men, was purely accidental, that no blame on this account attaches to Capt. Buddington; third, that to a great extent the objects, the lects of the expedition were accomolished before the death of Captain Hall, that is, that he reached a point of latitude not claimed heretofore by any arctic expedition; fourth, that the *Polaris* will return here before the end of the summer.

EUROPEAN.

Sr. Petersburg.—A remor is current that the Khivan expeditionary column under Gen. Kauffman, has met with a reverse. LONDON, 12 -A special from Mad-rid reports that the crisis in the government continues, and that ears are entertained of a serious outbreak. The Cortes remained in secret session most of yesterday, and during their deliberations armed volunteers surrounded the palace. A large force of police was concentrated at Column Doz de Mays, and troops were posted at other places in the city. The irreconciled press openly advocate a revolution. 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
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
