DEMISE OF L. P. HAMPTON.

Young Man Succumbs to Typhoid-Pneumonia—Had Been Married But Six Months.

Impressive Funeral Services Over Remains of Mrs. Jonathan Dye of Utah—Ogden News Notes.

The family of Mr. Edley F. Hampton was visited yesterday morning by the angel of death and the spirit of his son, Lawrence P., was called to the great beyond, after a severe illness of typhoid pneumonia, which lasted over a month. The deceased was twenty-one years of age and the pride of the family, and what adds more to the sadness of his untimely death is that he leaves a young wife, formerly Miss Elizabeth Garner of Huntsville, to whom he was married only last April. And she is also quite ill and it is feared she is afflicted with the same disease which took the life of her young husband just when their hopes were bright and happy. His sudden and unexpected death has cast a gloom over the entire community. Lawrence was born in Ogden, Utah, twenty-one years ago and has always been an industrious young man, obedient to his parents, devoted to his wife and kind to his many friends. The funeral services were held at the home of the deceased at 10 o'clock yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock.

GREAT FRUIT COUNTRY.

There are a number of mercantile houses in town, two banks, First National and the Farmers, several restaurants, hotels and lodging houses; all doing a very good business.

The railroad running through the town from Grand Junction is a narrow gauge and handles a deal of freight and considerable passenger traffic.

The town is the county seat of Delta county, and has a large court house. It is located in the delta or forks of the Gunnison and Uncompahgre rivers. There are a great number of fine houses here; the people have built magnificent, but probably not wisely, as, since the mesas or table lands have been cultivated, the waters have risen

and carried alkali salt to the surface and the whole town is covered with a crust of salt to which nothing but greasewood will grow. Still, there are a great number of lawns, etc., started on made land, but the town council is cutting large and deep drains through the town. If the Gunnison river is let loose on the town for a few days, there would not be much alkali left in town and it would leave a deposit of sand and silt on the ground good for the raising of wheat; but who would insure the town?

North Delta is mostly composed of the overflow deposits of the Gunnison. Since so many canals have been taken from the river above, no more overflow is probable.

IRRIGATION SCHEME.

There is a scheme on foot to take out the Gunnison river several miles above here and carry it through a 4-mile tunnel, the water to be used for fruit and grain; the state is said to be at the back of the scheme and probably the United States government may be induced to take a hand; at least, so it is hoped.

But the eternal contention in the population is peculiar; restless as the ocean; people come here from the older states to get their health, others are returning to Iowa, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and good ones who are yet people seem to be in good condition here and want to sell and move away to some better place.
