WAR TO BE WAGED

Makers of "Fire-Water" Are Alone in Evading Pure Food Law.

TORPEDO BOATS PURCHASED.

Other Gossip from the Nation's Capitol -"Divining Rod" Useless in Locating Water.

Washington, D. C., Oct. L.-The department of justice is preparing for a wholesale rate upon violators of pure food and drug act and it is probable that within the next few days arrests will be made in various cities of saloonkeepers who are selling improperly keepers who are selling improperly branded labeled compounded liquors.

Dr. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry of the department of agriculture says that the pure food law which was enacted on the 50th of June, 1906, has resulted in placing upon the American market purer foods and drugs than ever were offered for sale before, and that the United States today is living under a law which absolutely insures purity in our foods and drugs.

"WHISKY" TREACHEROUS "It is a remarkable fact," said Dr. Wiley, "that of all manufacturers who are effected by the law only those making whisky have shown any disposition to evade or dodge the provisions of the act as interpreted by the attorney general. Packers of all sorts of canned goods, salmen, sardines, vegetables and fruits came around to the law without the slightest trouble, and aw without the slightest trouble, and his in spite of the fact that hundreds of deliars' worth of labels had to be iestroyed. The manufacturers of whisky, however, especially those known is rectiffers, are endeavoring to do

"Under the advice of their attorney many of them—yes, the great majority of them—have absolutely refused to place the proper words on the bottles which they sell. The reason for it? Why, the reason for it is that they are afraid to let the public know how little whisky and how much pure alrohol with some little coloring matter added is sold under the name whisky.

"Of course this office has nothing to do with the prosecution of violators of this or any other law; we gather the evidence and the attorney-general dost the rest, and the attorney-general undoubtedly will proceed immediately ugalnst every whisky man in the country who persists in selling compounds Under the advice of their attorney

against every whisky man in the country who persists in selling compounds of alcohol, coloring matter and flavoring under the name of whisky. This law new on the attute books is for the protection of the public against fraud. It will be most rigidly enforced and everyone who violates it will have to suffer the consequences. I am confident if the rectifiers persist in their antagonism to the law that when the first cases are brought the public will hiss in arms against these whisky men, and the result is likely to be that the tide of prohibition which has struck the south will float to the northward and sweep out of existence in this city, at least. The law in itself is an excellent one, and no man doing a legitimate business need fear its enforcement but he who attempts to palm off upon his customers a compound of ethyl alcohol. customers a compound of ethyl al-cohol and flavoring extract as whisky will do so at hie peril. The public has a right to know what it obtains for its money and we propose that it shall have that information."

BUYS TORPEDO BOATS.

BUYS TORPEDO BOATS.

A day or two ago Secy. Metcalf entered into a contract with the Electric Boat company of New York, for the construction of seven torpedo bosts. The secretary had at his disposal an appropriation of \$2,000,000 made by the last Congress, it being provided that the boats which stood the most severe tests should be adopted. Under that law the secretary decided, after consulting the attorney-general and the president that he had a right to carry on experiments, to ascertain whether or not any other inventors have produced serviceable, safe and satisfactory type of sub-marine craft. It is understood that any inventor who can demonstrate to the satisfaction of a board appointed by the secretary of the appointed by the secretary of the navy that he has such a craft will have an opportunity to sell to the depart-ment one or more of his boats.

AMERICA BEHIND TIMES. The United States has evidently en-ered upon an era of submarine boat suilding, as in all matters pertaining building, as in all matters pertaining to warfare we are behind the nations of Europe. Hotchkiss, who invented the rapid fire machine guns, was American born, but not until after he had established a factory in England and another in France did the United States adopt the machine gun of the Hotchkiss type. Great Britsin, France and Germany had large fleets of high class vessels before the keel of the Atlanta, or the Yorktown was laid in 1882. It was only a short time before the Spanish-American war that the United States army was supplied with a modern army rifle instead of the old Springfield, and even at the battle of Santiage Springfield rifles were used and black powder was burned while the Spaniards had the Mausers and smokeless powder.

France has in all a fleet of 176 submarine torpedo boats and that country has adopted almost every type that has been offered to her naval authorities. Great Britain was more careful, and while she has a flottile of only 70, experts declare that the British sub-marines are equal in effectiveness to twice as many of the under-surface boats of the French navy. At the present time the United States has just an even dozen sub-marine torpodo boats. DIVINING ROD N. G.

For generations the "water witch" as the operator of the dyining rod has been called up and down the country directing the presence of underground water by all kinds of devices ranging in complexity from the forked branch of witch hazel, peach or other wood to more or less elaborate mechanical or electrical contrivances. Throughout the rural districts of the United States the divining rod has been held in very great veneration, superhuman powers being attached to it because of it ability to tell of the presence of underground streams of water. So many and so curious have the stories been in conjunction with the use of the divining rod that a member of the United States geological survey began experiments red that a member of the United States geological survey began experiments with a divining red of the witch hazel type, and recently made his results public, which results dissipate the myths and legends surrounding the water witches red. The geologists found after many tests that the down turning of the red resulted from slight and—until watched for—unconscious changes in the inclination of his body, the effects of which were communicated through the arms and wrists to the rod. No movement of the rod from causes outside the body could be detected, and it soon became obvious that tected, and it soon became obvious that the operation of the "divining rod" is generally due to unconscious move-ments of the body or of the muscles of the hand.

The experiments made by the scientist in question show that these movements happen most frequently where the operator's experience has led him to believe that water may be found. The uselessness of the divining rod is indicated by the fact that the rod may be worked at will by the operator. That he falls to detect strong currents of water running in tunnels and other channels that afford no surface indications of water and that his locations in limestone regions where water flows in well defined channels are rurely more successful than those dependent on mere guesses. 
