

UNITED STATES Comment of Press, Officials and People on Secy. Taft's Visit Most Enthusiastic.

SALE OF THE PHILIPPINES. That There Will be None Looked on As Meaning Will be No Extension of Japanese Influence.

Shanghai, Oct. 9.—The comment of the Chinese press, officials and people on the visit to Shanghai of War Secy. Taft is most enthusiastic. The reports published in the newspapers on this subject have been telegraphed to all parts of China. The general feeling of the Chinese on the utterances of Mr. Taft may be summarized as follows:

The United States will not sell the Philippine islands, an assurance which welcomed, as it means that there will be no extension of Japanese influence in the far east. The Chinese desire to interpret Mr. Taft's statement as meaning that the United States favors the open-door policy in China as being unofficial, but at the same time made on high authority and indicating that the United States will support it in China and maintain the policy in Manchuria, the only place where the open-door is threatened.

Mr. Taft's endorsement of the United States court for China, over which Judge Wiley presides, is looked upon as meaning a continuance of the new policy of justice and as demonstrating that the United States is really interested in China. The enthusiastic welcome accorded to Mr. Taft here atones for the boycott of American goods and demonstration of China's friendship for America.

JACK SIMPKINS' BODY. Said to Have Been Found Near Pierce City, Mo., Badly Decomposed.

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 9.—A body said to be that of Jack Simpkins has been found near Pierce City, Shoshone county, Idaho, badly decomposed. The only means of identification being a gun bearing a silver name plate and Simpkins' name. Miners who knew Simpkins well positively identified the gun as owned by Simpkins. It is thought that the man died in a snowstorm some time last winter.

ADMITTED THE MURDER. Oakland, Cal., Oct. 9.—John Albert Titus, a former mine owner of Alpert Camp, Siskiyou county, Cal., was shot and almost instantly killed by Robert C. Curtin this evening, in the presence of his 16-year-old daughter Velma, and two sons. Curtin was arrested five minutes after the murder and confessed to the crime. He said that Titus had kept company with his wife. He told of purchasing the revolver and planning the murder of Titus.

RAY MAGILL OBJECTS TO COLORED MAN ON JURY. Decatur, Ill., Oct. 9.—Thomas Miller, a colored man, was accepted by State's Attorney today as a juror to try the case of Ray Magill and her recently widowed husband, Fred H. Magill, the former Clinton, Ill., banker, whose trial began yesterday in the circuit court on the charge of murdering Ray Magill, Magill's first wife. The man insisted that a colored man should not sit on the jury with one of her seven counsel. A few minutes later the defense used one of its peremptory challenges, and the colored juror was excused. Magill left the jury box. Three more jurors were practically accepted today, making seven. No testimony will be given before Thursday.

DIVORCED PERSONS. Episcopal Bishops Reject Resolutions Prohibiting Their Marriage. Richmond, Va., Oct. 9.—The house of bishops of the general Episcopal convention today rejected a resolution offered by Bishop Doane, of Albany, which purported to prohibit the marriage of any party to a divorce. The resolution followed the consideration of the matter.

KIPPLING ON IMMIGRATION. Victoria, B. PAID HEAVY DUTY. Mrs. C. P. Huntington Assessed \$10,000 On Things She Brought Over. New York, Oct. 10.—Mrs. Collins P. Huntington, who arrived here yesterday on the steamship Kron Princesse Cecilie, paid \$10,000 duty on things she brought with her. Last year she paid \$20,000 and the year before \$30,000. She had been abroad for six months and said she was glad to get back to New York. She will not visit San Francisco this winter.

RAILROAD HOLD-UP FAILS. One in Russia Results in Two Passengers and One Robber Killed.

Riga, Russia, Oct. 9.—A band of armed men made an unsuccessful attempt Monday evening to get away with a large sum of money in transit over the Dnieper railway. The train was stopped by the robbers, who suddenly opened fire on the car ahead of them, in which a bank official with the money in his custody was traveling. The official returned the fire and for a while the exchange of shots was lively and consternation reigned on the train. When the matter finally was discovered, it was ascertained that a gendarme, two passengers and one of the robbers had been killed and the bank official had several passengers, including a woman, had been wounded. The robbers made their escape and the bank official saved his money.

HINES ACQUITTED. Killed Count Podhorsky for an Assault On His Wife.

Goldfield, Nev., Oct. 9.—John Hines, charged with the murder of Count Constantine Podhorsky, whom he shot and killed in a restaurant here last March, was acquitted tonight after the jury had deliberated for two hours. The defense pleaded temporary insanity. Hines claimed that Podhorsky, with whom he became acquainted in Nome, met Mrs. Hines in Seattle and assaulted her after playing her with wine.

Special Correspondence. Washington, D. C., Oct. 9.—The department of justice is preparing for a wholesale raid upon violators of pure food and drug act and it is probable that within the next few days arrests will be made in various cities of saloonkeepers who are selling improperly branded labeled compounded liquors.

Dr. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry of the department of agriculture says that the pure food law which was enacted on the 30th of June, 1906, has resulted in placing upon the American market purer foods and drugs than ever were offered for sale before, and that the United States today is living under a law which insures purity in our food and drugs.

"WHISKY" TREACHEROUS. "It is a remarkable fact," said Dr. Wiley, "that of all manufacturers who are effected by the law only those making whisky have shown any disposition to evade or dodge the provisions of the act as interpreted by the attorney-general. Pickers of all sorts of canned goods, salmon, sardines, vegetables and fruits, came around to the law without the slightest trouble, and in spite of the fact that millions of dollars worth of labels had to be destroyed. The manufacturers of whisky, however, especially those known as rectifiers, are endeavoring to do everything in their power to nullify the act."
