## LOCAL BRIEFS.

The ladies of St. Mark's cathedral will hold a cake sale tomorrow morning, at Walker's store.

The committee on organization of the Y. W. C. A. is meeting this afternoon, to further the plan of establishing such an organization here.

In Judge Diehl's court yesterday afternoon, Frank Greenup plead guilty to assaulting and beating his wife, Judge Diehl at once imposed a fine of \$15 or 75 days at hard labor.

Parties from Twin Falls say there is now a population of 2,500 at the Falls; also a modern hotel and eleven fair sized business blocks are going up, while a six miles car line to Shoshone Falls is planned.

There will be a fine program presented at tonight's Unity club concert, in Unity hall, in which will appear Miss Judith Anderson, contralto, Miss Judith Evans, pianist, Fred Graham, tenor, and Mrs. Jennie Stanger, reader.

C. B. Baltzell, a solicitor, was arrested yesterday afternoon and taken before Justice Dana T. Smith on the charge of appropriating to his own use \$30 he had collected for C. E. Blunk. Baltzell was released on \$100 bonds.

State Supt. of Schools Nelson went to Redmond today to attend the funeral of his nephew. The boy was seven years of age, and his father, Charles Nelson, is now on a mission in Scandinavia. The funeral will be held tomorrow.

Lieut. Sidney H. Guthrie of the Artillery corps has reported for duty at Fort Douglas from Fort D. A. Russell. Fire drill was held yesterday afternoon and the way in which the bugle call was responded to was highly satisfactory to the commanding officer.

There was a pleasant entertainment last night in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium in which W. T. Walker, Blair Richardson, M. M. Saxton, Henry Oberdorfer, Van Midgley, Ralph Desky, Archie Cohn, P. H. Field, R. O. Henson and George P. Dykes participated with credit.

Capt. Sam. Porter of the Kenyon hotel advises that Salt Lake be advertised through the publication in prominent eastern papers of stories explaining the future of Salt Lake and Utah. The funeral of Thomas Chope of Mammoth was held yesterday afternoon, from St. Paul's church in this city. The deceased was 61, and came to Utah 21 years ago from Ireland, where he was a mining superintendent. He suffered severe injuries 10 years ago by the fall of a mining cage, and afterwards went into mercantile pursuits. Death was the result of Bright's disease.

# HAMER IS AFTER THE NOMINATION.

St. Anthony Citizen Confirms Rumor of Congressional Aspirations.

WILL STICK TO PARTY TICKET.

Chief Clerk in United States Land Office at Hailey Boosting that Section.

Among the members of the Idaho delegation is Col. Thomas R. Hamer of St. Anthony who was appointed by Gov. Frank R. Gooding to attend the "See America First" convention. Col. Hamer yesterday afternoon confirmed the rumor to the effect that he was after the nomination for Republican congressman against Burton L. French, Idaho's present representative in the lower house.

"It is my intention to enter the race," he said. "I have received many assurances of support from all over the state and I am optimistic enough to believe that I will get it. I will submit my claims to the Republican state convention, and with or without it, I will support heartily my party ticket." Col. Hamer expressed himself as being of the opinion that there was not the slightest doubt that Idaho would go Republican next fall.

Col. Hamer won the eagles on his shoulder straps as commander of the Idaho regiment in the Philippines during the stirring times of war, receiving the appointment from the late Gov. Frank Steunenberg. He was chairman, both temporary and permanent, of the last Republican convention which nominated Gov. Gooding.

## BRAMEL A BOOSTER.

Another member of the Idaho delegation is W. H. Bramel, chief clerk in the United States land office at Hailey, Idaho. Mr. Bramel is a booster and in order to let the members of the convention know just what he had in his neck of the woods he brought along some three dozen large views of scenery in the famous Saw Tooth range of mountains which flank Wood river, adjacent to Hailey. He also brought along a stack of literature devoted to Blaine, E. B. Bingham and Fremont counties. Incidentally it might be stated that the late Jay Gould used to spend a month every summer during the last years of his life at Hailey where he tracked in his private car, he got near to nature and spent a great deal of his time in yanking big spanking trout from the Wood river and Silver creek.

Mr. Bramel is an ideal summer resort, a statement which is heartily endorsed morning, noon and night by Mr. Bramel.

## This Day In History.

JAN. 26th.

1764—J. B. Bernadotte, French soldier who became king of Sweden, born Jan. 26, 1746. Bernadotte was the son of a lawyer and became a soldier through enlistment as a common marine. Bravery on the field won for him rapid promotion in the wars of the revolution, and he became general of a division before Napoleon appeared upon the scene as commander. On the death of the crown prince of Sweden he was elected heir to the throne and became the colleague of Charles XIII, whom he succeeded, founding the Bernadotte dynasty represented by King Oscar II, third in the line.

823—Dr. Edward Jenner, inventor of vaccination, died; born 1753—Francis Jeffrey, famous British critic and senator of the college of justice, died in Edinburgh; born 1751.

1885—Fall of Khartum and assassination of Gen. Charles Gordon.

1905—Russian attack on the Sha river line, and Japanese with heavy loss to the assailants.
