

Coming Session Important One.

(Special Correspondence.)
Washington, D. C., Nov. 26.—If the program of the session, the program of the different executive departments is carried out the coming session of Congress will prove to be one of the most important in the history of the federal government. In the first place there is a very effective and active organization known as the National Rivers and Harbors Congress which has spread the propaganda of waterway improvements so effectively that there is not a state in the Union which has not a strong auxiliary organization working in entire harmony with the main body for the purpose of securing the adoption of a policy of waterways improvement which will, if carried into effect, result in a definite well considered plan for giving the United States a system of interior waterways equal to that of any country. This large organization will meet in December in annual convention and this week the Atlantic waterway branch are looking for a meeting in Norfolk which will be attended by the president of the United States and a number of his advisers when the preliminary plan in the campaign will be filed.

pure results looking to a revision of the currency laws and possibly the creation of a great central bank, similar to the Bank of England and the Bank of France. This program, contemplating such a radical departure in the currency affairs of this country is likely to create much hickering and to split party lines wide open. Ever since the days of Andrew Jackson a central bank program has been talked of, from time to time, but owing to the wide divergence of opinion between the various sections of the country as to the wisdom of such a policy, no substantial steps in the direction of the creation of a great central bank of issue have been taken since the national banking law was enacted.

FARMERS WANT RELIEF.
The interstate commerce commission is urging upon Congress a number of amendments relating to the powers of that branch of the federal service and in this will be supported by a number of organizations. The cattle men of the west do not think that they are treated as they should be in the matter of rates made by the railroads and within the past few months a

proposed that the pure food law be extended so as to compel the manufacturers of dairy products which are to be used in interstate commerce to prove through federal inspection that the animals from which the food products are produced are free from this disease.

Many of the states have on their statute books laws for the destruction of cattle and particularly dairy cattle, which show signs of the disease. It is urged that there should be federal inspection on the same lines and that the public should be protected from the possible danger of a transmission of disease just as they are protected under the federal pure food law from adulteration and the addition of poisonous material to all other food products.

PORHYDROMETER WEIGHS CARGOES IN BIG SHIPS

Demonstrations of the working of a porhydrometer, which were recently made in Liverpool, aroused considerable interest and are said to have proved highly satisfactory. The porhydrometer is an instrument for indicating the weight of cargo loaded into or unloaded from a ship. It consists merely of a float or "hydrometer," connected to a steelyard weighing machine and immersed in a chamber filled with water, the chamber being in communication with the outside of the ship. The ship rises or falls as the cargo is removed or placed on board, and the level of the water in the chamber falls or rises correspondingly, so that the float is immersed to a greater or less depth, with a consequent alteration in its apparent weight.

This alteration in apparent weight is read on the weighing machine, and from it the weight of the cargo is determined. In order that the reading of the apparatus may not be affected by the trim of the ship, it is necessary that it be fixed directly over the keel and in the plane of rotation of the hull, which generally will correspond approximately with the center of the ship. Also, it is necessary that the overall length of the float and its chamber be greater than the total vertical movement of the ship between the "light" and the "fully loaded" conditions. The appliance is of a very simple nature, and there should be no difficulty in fitting it to existing ships. The inventor claims that it has been officially approved by the Italian government customs.

USE OF ELECTRICITY URGED TO SUBSTITUTE OPERATIONS
Loss of use of the surgeon's knife and more use of electricity, which has been found to reduce inflammations, kill germs, build or tear down tissue and destroy infections, was a plea made to a gathering both of homeopaths and allopaths in Chicago which marks a trend of medical practice that has promise of less suffering, particularly for women. During a session of an organization of women physicians, the After Dinner club, Dr. May Cushman Rice related the results in the Chicago hospitals of clinical research in electrotherapy, declaring her conviction that 75 per cent of the operations performed are needless and that ordinarily no organ or part of the human body should be removed or could be without permanent injury to the patient. Recent improvements in methods and appliances, according to Dr. Rice, have shown that electricity, in applications of its various currents, galvanic, static and faradic, has cured appendicitis, prevented the dissection of women, abolished tumors, to say nothing of birthmarks and blemishes—and proved beneficial in the prevailing American ailment, neurasthenia. The event was especially notable owing to the presence of prominent members of homeopathy and allopathy, the meeting being presided over by a former president of the Illinois Homoeopathic association, Dr. Mary Hanko—Chicago News Letter.

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Perhaps one of the most important suggestions is that which is likely to come from the department of agriculture in reference to changes in the food inspection laws. There has been some difference of opinion between the scientific men of the country upon the question of the possibility of inoculation of human beings with tuberculosis germs from bovines infected by the dread disease. The consensus of opinion seems to be that dairy products from cattle infected with tuberculosis can be transmitted to human beings through food products from infected animals. It is a very well known fact that the first examination made by the experts of the department of agriculture in the slaughter houses are upon the throats of hogs. These throat glands show the presence of tuberculosis, when the disease exists, so plainly that there can be no question as to the condition of the animal and every one so affected must be condemned. The reason for this is the belief of the veterinarians, supported by the bureau of animal industry, that human health might be endangered were such carcasses permitted to be made into human food and it is held that the milk from a cow known to be suffering from tuberculosis is equally dangerous, especially in view of the fact that such milk is frequently fed to infants. ing to the restoration of the original boundaries of the District of Columbia. That is to say the president believes that a grave error was made in the year 1846 when the Virginia portion of the original territory set aside as a federal district was ceded back to the old dominion. The president is reported to advocate legislation looking to the recession of the Virginia portion of the district back to federal control. This never can be carried out without a very vigorous protest on the part of the Virginians who are affected as they do not like the idea of losing their rights, especially their right as citizens, which carry the right of franchise. It is doubtful, too, if the country at large will take such an interest in this program as to agree through its representatives in Congress to compensate the old dominion for the loss of territory, and this doubt is accentuated when it is remembered that Virginia has for years attempted to secure some sort of redress for the loss of that portion of the original territory of the state out of the early West Virginia was carved in the early '60s.

number of farmers' organizations from the grain growing sections of the west have been looking into the matter of freight to various points along the Mississippi river and have come to the conclusion that they are even worse treated than the cattle growers. 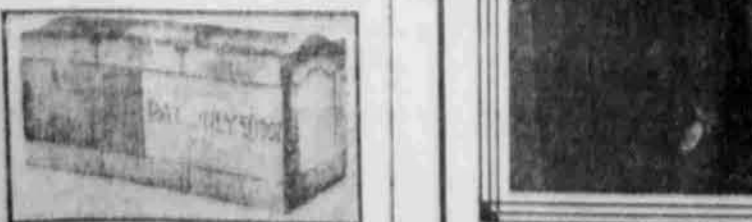
RETIRED OF SERVICE.

Senator Aldrich as head of the monetary commission which has recently made an exhaustive study of the financial policy of the principal countries of Europe will endeavor to as-

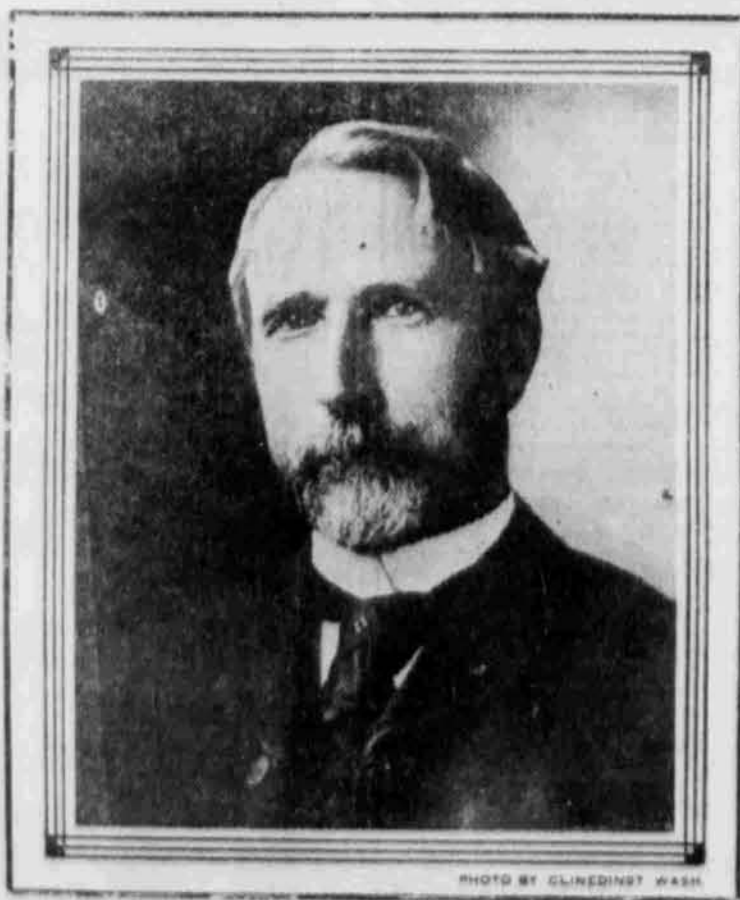
