

DIFFICULT SURGICAL OPERATION .- The Sacramento Union of the 27th ult. says:

"About a week since a little girl, daughter of Mrs. Blackburn, a widow lady of Rocklin, accidently swallowed a pine nut which she had in her mouth. The nut made its way into the wind pipe and thence to the lung, causing great distress. The child was brought to the city for medical treatment, but the cause of the trouble could not, of course, be reached in the position it occupied. A day or two since, however, the child coughed the nut up from the lung into the larynx, where it remained. On Saturday, a prominent surgeon of the city, who had been applied to. successfully performed the very delicate operation of cutting into the windpipe and removing the nut. Last evening the patient was deemed to be in a precarious condition, consequent upon the inflammation of the lung, which had become very severe prior to the expulsion of the nut."

Deceased was born in the State of Indiana, on the 14th day of May, 1834. Her parents moved to Harrison County, Iowa, in 1851. In the Spring of 1852, she left her parents, much against their will, and in June following started for the Valley of Salt Lake, in company with Agripps Cooper. At the earliest opportunity, after crossing the Missouri River, she was baptized into the Church, proving faithful therein up to the time of her death. She married V. J. Cooper on the 23rd of September, 1852. Her course of life was worthy of imitation,-Com.

Deceased was born in the town of Addison Lincoln County, Vermont, May 17th, 1812. He received the gospel in January, 1840, and gathered with the Saints to Nauvoo in the Fall of 1842. In the Winter and early part of 1846, his lot was cast with the first camp of Zion, while struggling through the wilds of Iowa, seeking an asylum in the West. He arrived at Council Bluffs that Spring; then he joined the Mormon Battalion, and went as far as Puebla, and staid to take care of the sick. From there he returned and met the Pioneers on Grand River, and traveled with them to Salt Lake Valley. In the Fall he returned with President B. Young to Council Bluffs; he arrived again in Salt Lake Valley with his family in 1849, He settled at Ogden, and remained till he was called on a mission to Salmon River, where he remained till the mission was broken up From there he went to Cache County to live, and was one of its earliest settlers. In all the trials and difficulties that he underwent with the people of God, his integrity to the cause did not in the least abate. Many times he made the Saints rejoice and lift up their heads, when he bore his testimony to the truth. He has gone to receive the reward of his labors.
