GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP.

In Amateur contest Travis the Only American Left.

London, June 1.—In the third of the amateur golf championship contests at Sandwich today H. M. Cairnes beat Dev. creux Emmett of the Garden City (N.Y.) Golf club by 5 up and 4 to play.

H. E. Laidley beat W. Burton, American, by 5 up and 8 to play.

Walter J. Travis, the American champion, beat R. Graham Martin, the secretary for Scotland, by 3 up and 1 to play.

Travis started moderately, but drew level at the sixth hole and took the lead at the seventh with two grand straight shots to the edge of the green. At the turn Travis stood one up. He was defeated by Laidley and Burton in the next two holes, but he won the next four and the match.

The next was halved and a win at the seventeenth gave Travis the match.

F. Williamson beat E. M. Byers, American at the nineteenth hole. Travis, therefore, is the only American left in the contest. Byers had a hard match. After being all square at the seventh hole he lost the eighth and stood one down at the turn. He again was square at the sixteenth, but lost the seventeenth, missing a short put. Williamson was bunkered at the eighteenth, where Byers secured, but the American missed a drive to the nineteenth and was beaten.

Travis played a strong game against Byers, who is the Irish champion. The American did not secure the lead until the seventeenth hole, being one down at the turn and two down at the sixteenth, but he won the next four and the match.

BIG DERBY STAKES.

Won by Leopold De Rothschild's St. Amant—Prize of 5,000 Sovereigns.

London, June 1.—The race for the derby stakes, of 5,000 sovereigns, about one mile and a half, at Epsom today, was won by St. Amant.

The result in detail was as follows: Leopold de Rothschild's St. Amant (Caynon) won, J. R. Thurley's John A. Gant (Thursday) second, S. B. Joel's St. Denis (Friday) third. Eight horses started.

"Skeets" Martin, the American jockey, was suspended until June 23 at Epsom today. He had the mount on Lady Honora, the winner of the Cathedral plate, and was disqualified for crossing and boring.

St. Amant led all the way and won by three lengths. Another three lengths separated the second and third horses. Andover was fourth. Gouvernant, a French horse owned by M. Blanc, and the favorite, was not placed.

The victory of Leopold de Rothschild's St. Amant was exceedingly popular, especially as it was through the efforts of a Frenchman who was the first to congratulate his old friend, while cheers resounded all over the morning, while greatly diminished the size of the crowd.

Blanc, who made his fortune out of the Casino at Monte Carlo and paid a record price, \$200,000, for Gouvernant's sire, Flying Fox, stood to win in the neighborhood of \$20,000 in bets on Gouvernant.

Chicago, June 1.—Bearcatcher, one of the California candidates for the American derby, made his debut on Chicago tracks in the second race at Hawthorne today and made good by winning handily.

When the barrier was sprung Bearcatcher was off like a shot and it took him only a few strides to get to the front. Ananias, second along with the leader for my fortune, then gave it up. New Mown Hay and Southerner then undertook to catch Bearcatcher, but he galloped along, winning easily by nearly two lengths. Soufrier, backed from 100 to 50 to 1, finished a half length in front of New Mown Hay. Opening at 8 to 5, the play was so heavy on Bearcatcher that he went to the post an odds on favorite.
