## SCOWCROFT AUTO COMES TO GRIEF

Turns Turtle on Road to Willard—Narrow Escape of Occupants From Death.

## LIVELY FIGHT IN SALOON.

Officer Cooney Has a Mixup in a Rum-shop Brawl—School Board Opens Bids.

Ogden, July 6.—While running at a rapid rate of speed yesterday, Albert Scowcroft's automobile was lost control of by Ralph Granger, the driver, and overturned with the occupants, all of whom but one escaped with slight injuries. The occupants of the automobile were Albert Scowcroft, Walter D. Bratz, John Walker and Ralph Granger, of Ogden, Walter McNeils, Albert Fisher, of Ely, Nevada, and Burg Robinson of Tintic. They were enroute from Ogden to Willard to play a game of ball. Ralph Grange was running the machine at a high rate of speed, and lost control of the same. In turning out to one side of the road near the Hot Springs, he turned too quick and the auto turned entirely over with them, but fortunately the heavy top on the machine protected several of the gentlemen from perhaps being crushed to death. Ernest Fisher was caught beneath the heavy machine and badly bruised up, and it is feared received internal injuries. Walter D. Bratz was severely bruised about the head. Those who were caught beneath the machine were pinned there until the aid of farmers living some distance away could be got to help turn the automobile back onto the wheels. The Ogden Automobile company has notified the city council and sent D. A. Smyth's machine out to take the men to Brigham City, where the Ely baseball team played a game with the Willard team, resulting in a score of 7 to 3 in favor of Ely. Mr. Scowcroft's automobile, which is next to the finest in the city, was badly smashed up. It will cost several hundred dollars to repair it. The wonder is that some of the members of the party were not killed.
