State Wagon Road-To Build Ratiroad For lieut Growers.

Bolse, Idaho, May 27,-The state wagon road commission decided to build the Warren-Big Creek wagon road and appropriated \$10,000 for the construction of the same. This is the first read to be built under the new commission. The total cost of con-struction is estimated at \$20,000., half of

struction is estimated at \$20,000, haif of which amount is to be paid by the citi-zens most interested and benefited by such a road. This is the rule adopted by the commission and will govern the construction of all roads in the state coming under its supervision. E. H.
