Former Stockholders of Salt Lake Oil Company Seek Big Money.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 27 .- One group of former stockholders in the Salt Lake Oil company today began suit against another group to recover \$70,000, which they allege they were de-franded out of in the sale of stock. The plaintiffs allege that through faise rep-reservations the defendants induced

rementations the defendants induced them to part with their stock in the company for \$2 a share, when it was actually worth \$15. The names of the plaintiffs and the respective amounts demanded by them use as follows: s as follows:

The fact that a number of the de-fendants named in the foregoing are well known clitzens of Salt Lake, the story is not lacking in local interest. whereby several oil companies of that state and the Salt Lake Oil company state and the Sait Lake Oil company were to be analgamated into a corpora-tion now known as the Amalgamated Oil company of Los Angeles.
