

Councillor Caine reported back amended (C. F. 13), "An act providing for the health and safety of persons employed in coal mines," passed as amended.

The committee on counties reported adversely on the petition of Sextus E. Johnson and 209 others, praying for a division of Kane county, on the eastern border, recommending that the prayer be not granted; report accepted and recommendation adopted.

The committee to whom was referred the matter of inquiring into the subject of the office of superintendent of meteorological observations, reported a bill for an act to repeal "a resolution creating the office of superintendent of meteorological observations and appropriating money therefor," and recommended its passage; report adopted and bill passed.

Adjourned till 2 p. m.

HOUSE.

February 14th, 2 p. m.

C. F. No. 12 was referred to the committee on judiciary.

C. F. No. 4 was taking up and passed.

Council amendments to (H. F. No. 11), "A bill for protection of keepers of inns, hotels and boarding houses," were concurred in.

MORNING SESSION.

February 15th, 10 a. m.

Mr. Penrose presented a petition of F. D. Richards and 160 others of Weber county, praying for an appropriation of \$5,000 for the erection of a high school building in Ogden City; referred to committee on claims and appropriations.

The committee on roads, bridges, etc., reported adversely to the petition of Daniel Thompson and 48 others for an appropriation of \$1,500 to be used for repairing a road at Scipio, Millard county; report accepted and committee discharged from further considering the subject.

House amendments to (H. F. No. 18), a bill to provide revenue, etc., were concurred in, excepting sections 5 and 22, which were referred to conference committee.

The committee on claims and appropriations reported favorably on the petition of W. H. Lee, for the remittance of uncollected taxes of 1873-4 and recommended that \$253.18 be placed on the appropriation bill, for his relief; report accepted.

Mr. Murdock presented a petition from William Thompson, sen., jailor of Beaver County, asking an appropriation of \$122 for services as said jailor; referred.

Mr. Rockwood presented petition of Albert Rees and 15 others for an appropriation for services as jurors; referred.

Messrs. Preston and Thurber, who had acted jointly with a like committee of the council, reported that they had examined the redeemed auditor's warrants, compared them with the treasurer's accounts and found them correct; report accepted and committee discharged.

The committee on municipal corporations reported adversely on petitions asking amendments of the Logan City charter, and another asking for a change of the Smithfield City boundary lines; report accepted and the committee discharged from further consideration of the subjects.

Adjourned.

A NEW DEPARTURE.

THE San Francisco Chronicle of Feb. 10 says—

"Judge Christianity, the new Senator from Michigan, a careful, accurate man, and a thoroughly trained lawyer, has been turning his attention to the Mormon problem. It has heretofore happened, as a general thing, that the congressional gentlemen who have been inspired by an ambition to take Brigham's scalp have been men of an 'emotional temperament' and sentimental ideas. They have not been men of a practical turn of mind or of practical ideas. They have made various attempts to bring hostile legislation to bear against Brigham and his peculiar institution, but have failed of accomplishing their purpose through their ignorance of the law. The great Mormon hierarchy has laughed at all their efforts, and has been able to nullify all their attempts at hostile legislation. But the Senator from Michigan, who knows the law, and who is bitterly opposed to Mormon institutions, has proposed a new system of challenges of jurors in polygamy cases which will tend to prevent the packing of the panel by the 'Saints,' and to promote the chances of securing a fair verdict."

Which being interpreted means that the past blundering sensational efforts for legislative proscription of the "Mormons" having proved a failure, the cool and careful policy of legalizing packed juries must be tried. Of course a carefully packed jury will bring in a verdict against a "Mormon" every time with no such word as fail.
