AN EXCELLENT EXHIBIT—THE SITUATION EXHIBITED SATISFACTORY.

The thirty-second semi-annual meeting of the stockholders of Zion's Co-operative Mercantile Institution was held at the Social Hall, on Saturday, the 5th instant, at 4.30 p. m., too late to give an account of the interesting proceedings for our last issue.

President John Taylor occupied the chair, calling from the numbers in the hall; there must have been over an average representation of the stockholders.

After the meeting was called to order and prayer by President George Q. Cannon, the following report was made by the officers of the Institution read the President's report for the fiscal year ending January 31st, from which we glean the following:

The manufacturing departments of the Institution are in a healthy and flourishing condition. No less than 33,566 pairs of boots and 67,767 pairs of shoes were turned out by the Shoe Factory during the past year. Over \$38,000 worth of duck, denim and broad cloth underwear was manufactured in the clothing factory, and these goods are manufactured at as low a price as they could be made either in San Francisco or the East. It is also generally conceded by competent judges that the Institution's home-made articles are superior in workmanship to the imported.

This Tannery is turning out a first-class article of leather and from the additional machinery and the changes lately made, it is expected that an increased production will result.

In the mercantile departments more than 175 hands are employed. The Institution is starting these branches of home industry, if we understand the matter aright, had in view the encouragement and development of home labor, and the giving of remunerative employment to citizens, rather than the making of large profits.

The cash receipts during the half year were \$2,107,363.12. The amount paid railroad companies for freight during the same period was \$149,491.87. The balance carried forward in the statement of liabilities and resources shows that the Institution had merchandise and cash on hand to the amount of \$1,295,481.68, while all its liabilities, exclusive of the capital stock, reserve fund and undivided profits, amounted to \$860,397.88. In other words the merchandise and cash on hand was sufficient to pay all outside liabilities and leave a balance in favor of the Institution of \$500,223.00.

A dividend of five per cent was declared for the half year, as appears in the statement only that the total dividends declared up to and including the present one \$229,408.53. In addition \$15,000 will be carried to the reserve fund, which will be thus increased to over \$140,000.00.

President Taylor, in his report, expressed satisfaction in the sound position of the Institution and very appropriately says:

"It is true we have had difficulties to contend with not alone in our freight matters, but in a general scarcity of money, and in the fact that the market trade Farmers have suffered alike with merchants, for while freight rates and commercial values generally have been falling, those of our stock produce has been brought from the Missouri river and sold in our home market for prices higher than our stock produced it for. And it must be remembered that our stock produce has all gone westward, and our freights was all on one side. Outgoing freight was charged strictly at the regular tariff, it was the incoming freight that was carried at the reduced rates, thus placing our producers and farmers at a double disadvantage. However, the Government has refunded freights were restored to regular tariffs, and the loss so provalled before the war was inaugurated."
