Father Bulfante, the Catholic priest at Castle Gate, is at the Holy Cross hospital suffering from a sprained ankle. The injury was received yesterday in a fall caused by an overcoat getting out of the way of a team.

Hon. J. W. Mullaney, ex-police judge of Denver, will deliver a lecture on "The Science of Electricity," at the First Methodist church next Thursday evening. The lecture is given under the auspices of the Keeley league and the public is cordially invited.

John Powell, a well known mining man of Nevada, is at the Salt Lake private hospital suffering with one of his hands from which the thumb was amputated Saturday afternoon. Powell received his injuries by a stamp in a mill in which his hand was badly crushed.

Two more Pullman coaches have been asked for by Professor Stephens, to accommodate the people who will attend the Tuberculosis choir on its California trip. Applications are coming in continuously and the number of excursionists including the singers has swelled from 30 to 60.

The "Messiah" service at the First Congregational church last evening was largely attended. Most of the famous oratorio was rendered, and those who sang were Mesdames C. G. Plummer, W. M. Ferry, Percy Somers-Cook, George Westwell, Miss Dwyer, Messrs. Gilbert, Daniel, Sands and Bennett.

This room will be used in addition to the room at present occupied for the purpose on the third floor.

The officers of the D. A. M. society who have been handling the silk award contest between Mr. Lytle and Mrs. Margaret E. Cain, disposed of the disagreeable affair yesterday by declaring that Mr. Lytle did not file his protest in time, and Mrs. Cain therefore will keep the prizes. The committee that so decided the matter was composed of President Nelson A. Empey, John H. White, Moses W. Taylor, J. C. Cutler and L. G. McDonald.

This morning about 200 students of the Latter-day Saints' University visited the exhibition of the arts given by the Utah Art Institute, in the Social Hall. Artists Taggart, Fairbanks and Mrs. Kerr, each took as many students as could conveniently view one picture at a time and explained to them the purpose of the artist in each of the principal paintings. This made the visit of the students profitable as well as interesting, and many were able to see that they had learned more about paintings during the hour thus spent

than they had ever learned before. Two more sections of students will attend the art exhibit tomorrow between the hours of 9 and 11 a. m. The faculty of the institution believe that the instruction of such works of art under the direction of artists will train the students what to look for in a picture and will give them some further knowledge of a subject more than that it is simply pleasant to look at.

BOLD BURGLARS VISIT OGDEN CITY

(Special to the "News.")

Ogden, Dec. 2.—Burglars were exceedingly lively and ambitious in Ogden last night and early this morning with the result that the desperate characters are now the possessors of a small arsenal, some jewelry and blankets.

The first robbery reported was that of Browning Bros. store on Washington avenue at 11 p. m. last night, when some person or persons threw some rocks through the 200 plate glass window and then made off with a number of revolvers of a total value of \$125.

The next burglary reported came from the Ogden Knitting works whose store is also situated on Washington avenue. Entrance to the place had been forced through the back window. It was discovered that six pairs of the best blankets in the house had been carried off, also three pairs of gauntlet gloves and a number of minor articles.

The Farley and Tribe barber shop at the Healy hotel was the third place to be broken into. It is thought that the burglary was committed at about three o'clock this morning. The thief gained admission through a transom in the rear of the place and succeeded in getting away with two watches. He would also have taken the money if he had not been apparently frightened away. He had removed the marble slab over the cache and had commenced to cut away the board which was in the way when he gave up the attempt. This circumstance leads to the belief that this crime was committed by someone who was acquainted with the place. One of the watches was discovered in the American pawn shop this morning, where it had been pawned by a negro. The police are now looking for the colored man. The other watch which is a valuable one and shows the date, month and time, has not yet been recovered.

At the police court this morning William Elford was given fifteen days for stealing a hat belonging to a brakeman of the Southern Pacific. A number of other minor offenders also were sentenced to do time on the rock pile.

FRICITION DRAFT CLEAR FOR CARS

Messrs. Sessions and Post Exhibit Latest Device to W. H. Bancroft.

EQUIPMENT LASTS LONGER. Former General Manager of Pullman Company and Inventor of Vestibule Features is in Salt Lake.

President George A. Post and Vice President H. H. Sessions of the Standard Coupler Co. of New York, arrived from the west yesterday morning, and are registered at the Knutsford hotel.

Mr. Post was a fellow member with Captain Singler of the Forty-eighth Congress, and when asked this morning if he still represented his district in the national legislature, he declared, "No, my no. 1 have returned long since, and am no longer in that business." Then he said: "This reminds me of an adventure of Luke Blackburn of Kentucky, Luke was traveling in Indiana when some one introduced himself and asked, 'This is Governor Blackburn, of Indiana, is it not?' Blackburn was ready with an affirmative as the application governor was pronounced, but when 'Indiana' was got off, buttoned up his coat, looked sternly at his interrogator as he replied, 'It is true, I am not feeling today, and the governor's name may indicate that I am in a state of ill-health, but I am not the governor of Indiana.'"

When asked how he liked the West, he said: "I like it very much. 'What has particularly attracted my attention is the up-to-dateness, up-to-snuffness of you western people. You do things right up in shape here, and in this city here at the Knutsford, are as fine as any man could wish, and we are staying here over tonight just to enjoy it.'"

Mr. Sessions was formerly general manager of the Pullman company, he is the inventor of the vestibule feature in car construction, and is himself a car-builder in the United States. He and Mr. Post have with them a working model of a new standard friction draft gear for cars with increasing resistance from the present maximum of 33,000 pounds to 45,000 pounds; and they were exhibiting the same to General Manager Bancroft of the Short Line today. As the railroads increase the size of their engines and the length of their trains, the pull on the draw-bar and draft gear has increased correspondingly, and the road works are being forced to use smaller loads is now insufficient to prevent a forward and backward jerk that acts like a battering ram on a car when even the most expert car-builder can't even and that is early and often. Mr. Sessions' device is a compact cast steel apparatus enclosing in a cylindrical jacket, 18 1/2 inches in diameter, the shaft of the spring, and a wedge shaped head facing the adjoining end of the car. This wedge imparts to the shaft a certain amount of wear and tear of cars were due to the insufficiency of the springs of the draft gear in use to withstand the pulls and bumps which are the increasing accompaniment of freight train motion.

ROAD TO GOLD FIELDS. Electric Service Into the Thunder Mountain District is Proposed.

General Passenger Agent Burley of the Short Line says that an electric road into the Thunder Mountain district from the Salmon river, as has been suggested, is feasible. With a dam across the Salmon river, electric power is readily acquired, certainly enough to supply all the electricity necessary to run an electric road over into Thunder Mountain. This would enable the proposed road to build a large smelter on the Salmon river near the dam and have plenty of power for the smelter as well as some other things. The dam would be 425-600 bushels more than were shipped in the corresponding week of last year.
