FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 10.—On motion, the

Senate went into committee on the

river and harbor bill—15 to 29.

Pendleton, Anthony and Bayard

were made a committee on inaugura-

tion.

The legislative appropriation bill

was referred.

Some private pension bills were

passed.

The postal appropriation bill was

taken up. The aggregate appropriation

made is \$42,500,000 or \$128,000

under the estimates, and \$2,000,000

above the last fiscal year.

Wallace said the department was

\$7,000,000 short. It had fallen to

\$1,500,000 this year.

Push moved an amendment for

\$1,000,000 to establish lines of Ameri-

can from ocean ports, with 50,

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 10.—The morning

hour was devoted to the discussion

of a bill to amend the act of March

1878, relating to the call of States begun. A number of

Small Fox.

A map has been prepared, dotted

to show the place in which cases of

small-pox have been discovered be-

tween January 1st and Feb. 5th.

Eighty-six cases are reported in that

time; 27 were concentrated upon a

few acres of ground in the city of

Pearl, Park, Chatham and Canal

streets, and the Bowery, built up

with tall, wretched tenements, and

the other 59 cases are distributed

over Manhattan Island. In two

houses in a block between Grand,

Crosby, Elm and Broome streets,

there were five cases. In a house

in East Forty-sixth Street, three; and

as many in a tenement in East Six-

ty-sixth St. Two cases were found

in the unexcused district, and one in

Spuyten Duyvil. The whole num-

ber of cases of small-pox in this city

since Jan. 1st is 107.

THE MEXICAN.

New Orleans, 10.—The damage

by Sunday's storm along the Mis-

sissippi Sound, from Pascagoula to

the Bay of St. Louis, is \$100,000.

four feet deep, and in low, one-story

houses everything is washed out.
