# MRS. JEFFERSON DAVIS, WHO IS DANGEROUSLY ILL.

Mrs. Jefferson Davis is seventy-seven years of age!" She was born Varina Howell and was married to Mr. Davis when she was eighteen. She was his second wife, the first being a daughter of General Zachary Taylor, afterward president of the United States. This was a runaway match, the young wife dying while still estranged from her father, within a year of her marriage. In 1845 Mr. Davis married Miss Varina Howell. The same year he was elected to congress, but resigned in 1846 to go to the Mexican war. He was severely wounded, and when he returned Mr. and Mrs. Davis went to live at their Brierfield plantation in Mississippi. While her husband was in Washington as a United States senator and secretary of war Mrs. Davis made many of the acquaintances which have endured to this day. Since the death of her husband she has lived in a hotel in New York city, though she owns a good deal of property in Mississippi. Mrs. Davis has but one living child, Mrs. I. A. Hayes of Colorado Springs.
