The County Court Takes Up the Charges Against Bowman.

THE CONSTRUCTOR'S DILEMMA.

Taking of Testimony Commenced: An Ex-Liberal Notion One of the Witnesses Called.

The inquiry into the charges of bribery preferred against the well-known contractor for the city and county building, J. H. Bowman, an outline of the circumstances of which last night appeared in the columns of the News, began yesterday, promises to be a searching affair.

Judge Smith presided, with him being present, District Attorney, County Attorney, City Council members, Messrs. Anderson, Spafford, Lynn, Hyde and Young were also present.

County Attorney Murphy and City Attorney Hall represented the authorities. Judge Powers sought to show that the County Court had no jurisdiction in the hearing of this matter, arguing that one of the chief reasons under the jurisdiction of the Third District court.

County Attorney Murphy declined to argue the point but asked that under the statute the witness be made to give testimony or be proceeded against.

A motion was made and carried to the effect that the court should proceed with the hearing of the case, Judge Smith saying that while he would not vote against the motion he seriously doubted the legality of the proceeding.

W. B. Hinkley, one of the bondsmen of Bowman, whose signature was required to have been witnessed by that of "Lester," George Olson, was the first person put upon the stand to be examined by County Attorney Murphy.
