DEATH FROM LOCKJAW. Resulted from Administration of

Diphtheria Anti-Toxine. Half Hearted Cheers for York.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 1.—The death list attributed to lockjaw, as the result of the administration of diphtheria an-ti-toxine managed by the city chemist, now numbers eleven, two deaths being reported today. Eleven others reported are deported to the health department as suffering from lockjaw with slight chances of recovery. The cause of lock-jaw in each case is said to be poisoning from the city's diphtheria anti-toxine. Statistics from Census.

Washington, Nov. 1 .- The census report on school, military and voting ages for all states and territories, shows the following summary for the country as a whole:

Persons of school age, 5 to 20 years, 26,110,788, of whom 24,867,130 are native born, 22,490,211 are white and 12,806,160 are males. Males of military age, 16,360,363, of whom 13,132,280 are native born and 14,495,396 are white; and males of voting age, 21,329,819, of whom 16,227,-285 are native born and 19,306,143 are

Of the total number of males 21 years of age and over, 2,386,255 are illiterate. Of the 16,227,285 native born males 21 years of age and over, 1,706,293 are ll-literate, and of the 5,102,534 foreign born, 620,002 are illiterate.

Native white males of voting age who are of foreign parentage show a rela-tive increase in their proportion since 1890, while the colored males of voting age have increased throughout the northern and western sections, with a few exceptions like California, where there has been a large decrease in Chi-

nese population. In many southern states, especially Virginia, North Carolina, South Caro-lina and Louisiana, the colored element of voting age shows a decreased proportion

Foreign white males of voting age show an increased proportion in all New England states except Vermont. There has been a relative decrease in all of the remaining states and terri-

A little over 28 per cent of the entire allen population of the country is il-literate. This is notably so in Louisalten population of the country is in-literate. This is notably so in Louis-iana, where they constitute nearly one-half of the aliens. The statistics show that the average number of persons to each potential voter range from 3.1 to 3.5 in the North Atlantic states; 3.4 to 3.6 in the North Central states; 4 to 4.4 persons to each potential votes in
