

## THE KAISER SCENTS DANGER

It is the Great American Trusts  
He Fears.

## FAVORS A CUSTOMS UNION

On Similar Lines to the Continental  
Blockade Devised by Napoleon  
Against England.

New York, Nov. 2.—M. Pierre de Segur gives a highly interesting account in the current number of the Revue de Paris of the reception given by the Kaiser on board the Hohenzollern to a party of French tourists at odds, says the Herald's Paris correspondent.

"His conversation with us," writes M. de Segur, "was chiefly about America. To him there is a menace for the future in the colossal trusts, so dear to the Yankee millionaire, which tend to place an industry or an international exchange in the hands of a single individual or group of individuals."

"Suppose," he said in substance, "that a Morgan succeeds in combining under his flag several of the oceanic lines. He does not occupy any official position in his country outside of the influence derived from this wealth. It would therefore be impossible to treat with him if it should happen that an international incident or a foreign power were involved in his enterprise and neither would it be possible to have recourse to the state, which, having no part in the business, could decline any responsibility. Then to whom could we turn?"

"In order to obviate this danger," the Kaiser foresees the necessity of forming a European customs union against the United States on similar lines to the continental blockade devised by Napoleon against England, in order to safeguard the interests and assure the freedom of continental commerce, at the expense of America's developments and he declared to us without circumlocution that in such an eventuality England would be forced to choose an alternative of two absolutely opposite policies—either to adhere to the blockade and place herself on the side of Europe against the United States, or else to join the latter against the powers of the continent."

**Voyron Letters Exasperate Germany.**  
New York, Nov. 2.—The Berlin correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says German exasperation at the letters from Gen. Voyron to Count von Waldersee is fomented by the German press. The Neueste Nachrichten infers that the old French hatred of Germany remains, in spite of its temporary abatement. The Vossische Zeitung says Gen. Voyron's praise of French humanity is a reflection on Germany and a side light on Emperor William's "fun" speeches.

**Birth of the Aero Club.**  
New York, Nov. 2.—A dispatch to the Herald from London says: The Daily Mail gives an account of the birth of the Aero club, which will devote itself to ballooning.

As the balloon of the future promises to become an automobile, it is not strange that the aero club should be the offspring of the well known automobile club, which will immediately acquire the balloons of one or more expert aeronauts. Thus equipped its members will hold races in mid air and other contests.

M. Santos-Dumont is to be an honorary member, and the Hon. John Scott-Montague, the Hon. I. S. Rolfe, Sir David Salmon, Col. Temple, R. E. Mr. Paris Singer, the Rev. J. M. Bacon and officials of the aero club are all mentioned as supporters.

"It is the success of the movement in France may be an augury," said a well known automobile, "then the success of the new aero club in Great Britain is assured."

**Long's Navy Plans.**  
Washington, Nov. 1.—Over and above the four warships for which Congress directed him last session to prepare plans as a basis for appropriation at the next session, Secy. Long has before him the recommendations of the board of naval construction looking to authorization by Congress of the building of forty more vessels of classes from the battleship down to tugboats. The plans for the two armored cruisers and two battleships projected by Congress last session have been already prepared and look to the construction of 18,000-ton battleships and cruisers.

**QUICK TIME TO LONDON.**  
Engineers Working on Plan to Make Trip in 100 Hours.

New York, Nov. 2.—New York to London in 100 hours is the problem for which two great American railroad companies are considering two solutions, says the Journal and Advertiser.

The New York Central's engineers are working out the details of a plan involving the following route to Europe, with a view of determining its mechanical and commercial probabilities: New York to Boston by New York Central and Hudson River and Boston and Albany lines. Boston to St. John, N. B., by Boston and Maine railroad and connections. St. John to a port on the Irish west coast by a line of swift steamships to be established. By rail to Dublin; packet across Irish channel; rail to London. Time four days, four hours.

Pennsylvania railroad officials and Clement A. Griscom, of the American Steamship company, are having brought to their attention anew the cherished plan of Austin Corbin, who desired to establish a steamship port at Montauk point, cutting many hours off the trip by way of Sandy Hook and making through traffic for the Long Island railroad. The Corbin plan, included with the anti-toxine Pennsylvania, which now controls the Long Island, makes two jumps of the ocean voyage, as follows: New York to Greenport by Long Island railroad; the East River tunnel, when completed, would make this a tow hours run without change from a terminal in downtown New York, Greenport to Halifax, N. S., by fast steamship. Halifax to Southampton.

**Trying to Boycott British Vessels.**  
New York, Nov. 2.—A dispatch to the London Times and the New York Times from Marseilles says the resolution passed by the Dockers' syndicate as the result of representations made by the Dutch dockers who are trying to organize a boycott of British commerce, is merely academic. It expresses a desire that active propaganda may put an end to the war in South Africa.

The Dutch dockers, adds the dispatch, do not attempt to conceal their disappointment. They will return direct to Amsterdam, abandoning the other proposed visits.

The opposition of commercial circles to the scheme has become still more marked. Eleven British navigation companies form the most important element of the international trade of Marseilles. The vessels of these lines form one-fourth of the total tonnage of the port.

**Loubet May Visit Russia.**  
New York, Nov. 2.—The Paris correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says there is already some talk of a return visit by President Loubet to St. Petersburg next June.

## FRENCH FLEET IN TURKISH WATERS

Austria Does Not Contemplate It With Indifference.

## WILL HAVE A GOOD EFFECT

Opposition in France Will Oppose Government for Sending the Squadron.

New York, Nov. 2.—The Vienna correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says the prospect of a French naval demonstration in Turkish waters is not contemplated with indifference in the Austrian capital, but it is believed that Turkey will yield. It is thought possible that the British squadron now at Malta will be ordered to Turkish waters.

The Vienna Tageblatt says the appearance of western European warships will have a lasting effect on the Turkish population. One spark would suffice to blow up the Turkish powder magazine.

**WILL OPPOSE GOVERNMENT.**  
New York, Nov. 2.—Commenting upon the departure of the French fleet for the Levant the Paris correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says:

The French opposition is now menacing the government because it sent out the squadron to the Levant without the permission of the parliament. The correspondent remarks that it is folly to expect that the French government would deliberately inform another government in advance of its intention to support the arguments of diplomacy by force of arms. A great majority of impartial Frenchmen support the action of the authorities. In fact the invasion of the brilliant and strange world of the Orient by a French fleet fires the popular imagination and relieves the monotony of events by which France has been seriously bored.

**N. Y. Corporation Laws Changes.**  
New York, Nov. 2.—The changes in the New York corporation laws and the reduction of the tax for privilege of organization by the last legislature have resulted in a large increase in the number of stock companies forming in this state. Frank White, the author of several works on corporation law, is authority for the statement that during the ten months of the present calendar year, ended October 31, 2,118 new corporations had been organized under the New York laws which, he says, indicates a total for the year of more than 2,500, as against 1,900, the largest number ever formed in any preceding year.

**Wife Kills Her Husband.**  
Milo, Maine, Nov. 2.—The coroner's jury which investigated the murder of Thomas Gero, at Chesuncook, a region far up in the woods beyond Moosehead lake, has found that he came to his death from knife wounds inflicted by his wife. The chief witness was a guide, Fred Holt, who was going down the lake in a canoe. He heard screams or the Gero cabin, and going ashore looked into the cabin and saw Mrs. Gero standing over her husband with a bloody knife in her hand. Mrs. Gero is being brought out of the woods by the sheriff for a court hearing.

**Next Phi Delta Theta Convention.**  
Northampton, Mass., Nov. 2.—At the business meeting of the Phi Delta Theta convention, held here, it was decided that the next convention shall be held Thanksgiving week, 1903, with the chapter in Syracuse university, New York.

**Statistics From Census.**  
Washington, Nov. 1.—The census report of school age, 5 to 20 years, 26,110,788, of whom 24,832,139 are native born, 2,490,211 are white and 12,896,169 are males. Males of military age, 16,360,383, of whom 13,132,289 are native born and 14,495,396 are white; and males of voting age, 21,329,819, of whom 16,227,255 are native born and 13,396,143 are white.

Of the total number of males 21 years of age and over, 2,396,255 are illiterate. Of the 16,227,255 native born males 21 years of age and over, 1,766,232 are illiterate, and of the 5,162,334 foreign born, 620,002 are illiterate.

Native white males of voting age who are of foreign parentage show a relative increase in their proportion since 1890, while the colored males of voting age have increased throughout the northern and western sections, with a few exceptions like California, where there has been a large decrease in Chinese population.

In many southern states, especially Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Louisiana, the colored element of voting age shows a decreased proportion.

Foreign white males of voting age show an increased proportion in all New England states except Vermont. There has been a relative decrease in all of the remaining states and territories except New Jersey.

A little over 28 per cent of the entire alien population of the country is illiterate. This is notably so in Louisiana, where they constitute nearly one-half of the aliens. The statistics show that the average number of persons to each potential voter in the states is 2.4 in the North Atlantic states; 2.4 to 4.4 persons to each potential voter in the South Central states; from 3.3 to 4.7 in the South Atlantic states; from 2.4 to 4.1 in the Western states, and 1.7 to 1.9 in Alaska and Hawaii.
