

poll evil, or fistula, I would say, don't sell the animal for a trifle, or give him away, but cure him sound and well. I care not how long it has been running, it can be cured with one dime; yes, one dime's worth of muriatic acid will cure the worst case of old poll evil.

First wash the sore well with strong soap suds, then drop eight or ten drops of the acid in it twice a day, until it has the appearance of a fresh wound; after which, it should be washed clean with suds made from castile soap, and left to heal, which it will quickly do if the acid has been used long enough; but if it does not get well, apply the acid again, until it does cure, for it is a sure remedy, and will not fail, if it is applied until the diseased flesh is all burnt out.—[Prairie Farmer.]

A SHOENING STOOL FOR BLACKSMITHS.—A gentleman residing in the State of New-York, has invented a shoening stool for blacksmiths for shoening horses, which he says he has found very useful, and gives the following directions for making it, for the benefit of the craft:

"I make a light portable stool of the form of a common crutch with one leg, and put a cushion on the seat. To this is secured a strap, which passes around above the hips, and is buckled tight in front. The seat of the stool is about four inches thick, and is held to its place in the leg by an iron spur.

The blacksmith puts it on behind and between his thighs and buckles it in front, and the horse's foot is placed on the seat; it thus supports the weight of the animal's leg, and relieves the back of the shoer from that severe strain which makes horse-shoeing such hard work."—[Ex.]

POWER OF INSTINCT.—The sluggish sea turtle loves her home. A huge creature of this kind was caught by English sailors near the island of Ascension, who burnt a name and date into its upper shell. On the way to England it fell sick, and from sheer pity it was thrown overboard in the English channel. Two years later the same turtle was captured once more, now quite well, near its old home, Ascension. What strange and inexplicable home-sickness carried the slow, heartless creature 4000 miles back through the ocean where there is no track and no high roads?—[Putnam's Magazine.]

MANUFACTURE OF STEEL BY ELECTRICITY.—The London Mining Journal contains an account of some experiments, by which, in contradistinction to the ordinary method of manufacturing steel, it is proved that a process has been discovered of converting iron into steel by a current of electricity, passed through the iron when placed in a furnace, and embedded in charcoal, whereby an immense saving of labor, time and fuel, is the more immediate result. Different qualities of steel can be produced by the process, with a certainty, regularity, and efficiency hitherto unattainable.—[Ex.]

SURE CURE FOR DYSENTERY.—Take one tablespoonful of common salt and mix it with two tablespoons full of vinegar and pour upon it a half pint of water, either hot or cold (only let it be taken cool.) A wine glass full of this mixture will be found quite efficacious in curing dysentery. If the stomach be nauseated, a wine glass full taken every hour will suffice. For a child, the quantity should be a teaspoonful of salt and one of vinegar in a tea-cup full of water.—[Ex.]

SMALL FARMERS.—If there is one man to be pitied more than another it is he who possesses so much land that he knows not what to do with it; yet there are many who are so bent on having a large farm that they will sacrifice health, ease and happiness, that they may be known as the possessor of so many acres, without once thinking how they are to improve it. Land pays nothing; it is the crops that are grown on it.—[Boston Cultivator.]

THREE CRIMES AND THEIR REWARDS.—In the jail at East Cambridge, Massachusetts, a man is undergoing four months' imprisonment for unmercifully beating his own horse.
