SENATE.
WASHINGTON, 7.—The Senate, 90 to 29, refused to go into executive session.
Vance denied that North Carolina ever repudiated her debt; she had been forced by reconstruction acts at the dictation of the loyal, honest, virtuous republican party of the north, to repudiate her obligations, but it was not voluntary. Riddleberger was a democrat, an unrepentant readjuster. How could the republicans forgive him? Why support him. He objected to voting for any democrat who had a surname before the word democrat. The forbidding of Riddleberger upon the Senate was a defiance of the whole plan of post-war salvation. He has been taken up in sin, unrepentant, and been translated into the heaven of republicanism without having tasted of death.
Kellogg made a speech upon the North Carolina debt question, asserting that since that state had been under the control of the democrats the State debt had been scaled from \$18,000,000 to \$28,000,000, a repudiation of \$10,000,000.
A long discussion ensued, the North Carolina senators answering Kellogg's charges, and denying that the state had, in any manner, repudiated its honest obligations.
Ransom called attention to the fact that the 4 per cent. bonds of North Carolina were quoted at 85c. on the dollar, and he appealed to the senator from Ohio (Sherman) to state whether that was not a high price for state bonds.
Sherman replied it was a fair price for 4 per cent. state bonds.
Adjourned till Monday.
WASHINGTON Gossip.
WASHINGTON, 7.—Democrats seem to have thought certain republicans were not supported by the Administration. The President said to some Virginia republicans, to-day, he was in full sympathy with the independent movement in Virginia, and would do all he could for it. He believed the proper course for republicans to pursue was to work with the Board of Finance, and the democratic party wherever possible. He did not endorse the position assumed by some managers of the republican party in Virginia, who opposed any coalition with Maline. This declaration shows that Garfield does not approve the movement in Virginia, which at the very time when a coalition was about to be effected which might have insured the electoral vote of the State to republicans, denounced all efforts at coalition and prevented it. Straight republicans in Virginia, under the lead of Gen. Wickham, have thus been officially notified that the coming summer and autumn. There are many reasons for believing the time is ripe for such an organization, and with leaders of ability and determination, the greater number of those States can be carried and controlled by such independent organization, and the movement for the coming year. Some Southern republicans are to the movement. They belong to the class of men who have kept power in the States or at Washington, only by concentrating the negro vote.
The Senate adjourned until Monday this afternoon, partly by reason of weariness with long-contested speech making, but mainly because Vice President Arthur desires to go to New York to-night, and because it was evident that during the absence of the five senators who leave Washington to-morrow morning with the remains of Senator Carpenter, no substantial progress is likely to be made towards any settlement of the present conflict. Whereas, on the other side, an intermission of several days in the heated debate may naturally tend somewhat to promote its final termination.
Senator Jones, of Nevada, who went to New York last Monday night on the same train with Senator Conkling, returned last evening. The report that his trip was for the purpose of endeavoring to bring about a withdrawal of Judge Robertson's nomination, has no foundation whatever, as he has been metropolis simply to look after his personal interests. Representative Page has also returned from New York. Senator Fair left Washington this evening for St. Louis, to be absent about ten days. Senators Teller, of Colorado, and Maxey, of Texas, have joined and left for the session. Senator Edmunds' rail has been transferred to Senator Garland, of Arkansas, who has also taken his departure not to return again this session.
The statement of numerous dispatches from here, that the President may decide to revive the ancient custom and go to the dead lock, is all both. He has, in short, not interfered and naturally has hoped to see his party win. Now that the democratic party is not suffering because of the deadlock, it is believed the President will ask his friends in the Senate to go into situation much longer.
