A TEACHERS' STANDING.

How the State Board of Education Will

### Keep Track of It Hereafter.

The state board of education at its meeting yesterday afternoon adopted a new method of correcting the examination papers of school leachers. Instead of allowing the country superintendents to examine the papers and then keep them, the board now requires the papers to be sent to the office of the state superintendent after they ar cor-rected, where they will again be cor-rected by a committee of the state board and a record will be kept of the standing of the teachers in the differ-ent counties. ent counties.

A communication was ordered sent to the various county superintendents calling their attention to the new state statute requiring all teachers who have symptoms of infectious or hereditary diseases to submit to a medical exam-ination. The names of teachers who are thought to be affected must be sent in by the superintendents and the ones so reported must be examined at their

expense The board fixed Nov. 5 and 6 as the dates for the special teachers' examina-tions for the benefit of teachers who

tions for the benefit of teachers who do not hold permanent state certif-cates. All temporary certificates will be void after those dates.
