Jury Awards Harvey G. Taylor \$200 in \$10.000 Damage Suit.

LECTURE BY B. H. ROBERTS.

Ogden, Utah, June 14 .- The hearing of the \$10,000 damage sult brought by Harvey G. Taylor against Ogden City, F. J. Riesel & Co., David Eccles and Joseph H. Myers, was completed last evening at 6 o'clock, and submitted to the jury for their determination of the merits of the case. The case has been on trial for over a week in the district court before Judge Howell and a jury has been bitterly contested ghout the entire proceedings. throughout There has been a large array of attor-There has been a large array of attor-neys in the case. The plaintiff was represented by N. J. Harris, Hulanish and Peery. The city by City Atty. Bag-ley, David Eccles, by Richard & Prait, Riesel & Co, by Haywood & McCor. mick, and Myers by M. D. Lessinger. The first hard fight in the case came when the attorneys for the defendants moved for a non suit, which point was argued for two days. The motion was ed, and for days both sides have been introducing evidence.
