French Borrow Money.

New York, May 17 .- It is stated that when tork, shay in-the stated that within the last fortnight bankers of Parls have, through the Bank of France, negotiated a loan of \$15,000,000 from New York bankers.

This money is needed to finance enterprises incident to the exposition year in Paris. While France is one of the richest countries in the world, its stock of gold was insufficient to meet all the demands that have sprung up this year and the bankers of Paris have borrowed here at comparatively low in-terest rates in order to prevent any enterprise from lagging. Since January 1 the Parisian bankers

have been attempting to make this loan. They tried in vain to borrow money in Berlin but funds were high there. England had all she could do to meet the expenses of the Boer war and prevent industrial stagnation at home.
