All our ideas of life are based upon the family; thereto our civilization is built. We are born, we live, we die for the family; the family gives us our colossal strength, our perpetuity. And it also gives us that easy reliance in ourselves which lets us drift, sometimes for centuries, secure always in the faith that if some members of the the faith that if some members of the family may be weak, or foolish, there will always be a strong member to fight, to maintain, to shield.
