Philadelphia, Pa., April 3.-Not to be outdone in diplomacy by Emperor William of Germany, the sultan of Turkey has asked Miss Alice Roosevelt, the daughter of President Roosevelt, christen the Ottoman cruiser Medjidia, when that vessel is launched from the Cramps shippard early in May.
