

TOO HAPPY TO EXPRESS HIMSELF

All Afternoon Preceding Announcement of Nomination, Under Nervous Tension.

PRESIDENT MUCH PLEASED.

Hughes and Cannon Send Congratulations Messages—Foraker in Line—Bryan Has Nothing to Say.

Washington, June 18.—"Words do not find themselves at a time like this. I do not deny that I am very happy."

This was the response of Secy. William H. Taft to a request for an expression of his views on his nomination for the presidency. The sentences did not come easily. Throughout the afternoon preceding the announcement of his nomination the secretary had been laboring under suppressed nervous tension. The atmosphere of his office was electric with excitement. Notwithstanding the great personal interest which he had in the proceedings at Chicago, a thousand times over, Secy. Taft did not permit politics to interfere for a moment with his transaction of official business as secretary of war. In the intermissions between bulletins from the convention the secretary disposed of several important departmental questions, and when his nomination for the presidency was announced his desk practically was cleared of important official business. Throughout the afternoon the private office of Secy. Taft and the office of his private secretary, Frederick Carpenter, were thronged with members of his family, intimate personal and official friends and newspaper men.

PRESIDENT GETS NEWS.

Washington, June 18.—The president was playing tennis with Asst. Secy. Bacon of the state department when Mr. Loeb took him the news of the nomination of Secy. Taft for the presidency by the Republican national convention. He had previously prepared a statement declaring Mr. Taft to be the best candidate the Republican party could get for the high honor paid him today, and as soon as the news of the nomination reached him it was given to the newspapers. Then he continued with his game of singles until the time arrived to go in to dinner.

While the day was one of great interest and while Mr. Roosevelt read all the important bulletins, there was no such intense interest as that which characterized the previous day, when for nearly an hour the convention broke into an uproarious ovation for the president.

There were many callers at the White House during the day. Secy. Taft remaining in the executive office for nearly an hour in the morning. Other visitors who called on the president occupied his time quite fully. But at 2 o'clock he broke his custom by going driving for an hour with Mrs. Roosevelt. Their horses having been forwarded to Oyster Bay, they had to forego their customary recreation of horseback riding.

This evening, by invitation, Secy. Taft went to the White House.

PRESIDENT IS PLEASED.

Washington, June 18.—Immediately upon receiving news of the nomination of Secy. Taft for the presidency, President Roosevelt said:

mately for many years and I have a peculiar feeling for him, because throughout that time we worked for the same object, with the same purposes and ideas. citizenship, which lies at the foundation of our national well-being."

MESSAGE FROM CANNON.

Chicago, June 18.—Before the calling of the roll call on the presidential nomination had been completed, Speaker Cannon had sent a message to Secy. Taft conceding the secretary's nomination, tendering his own services in the campaign and congratulating him. The speaker's message was as follows:

"Chicago, June 18.—Hon. William H. Taft, Washington: You have been nominated as candidate for the presidency by the Republican national convention. I heartily congratulate you. You will be elected by the people in November. Illinois will cast her electoral vote for you. Whatever I can do for your success and that of the party will be done.

(Signed.) "J. G. CANNON."

FORAKER'S CANDIDATE NOW.

Washington, June 18.—Until the convention made a nomination every Republican had a right to his own choice," said Senator Foraker after hearing of the nomination of Secy. Taft for the presidency; "but now it is no longer a question of men, but a question of party. In this way Secy. Taft becomes my candidate for the presidency, and while under all circumstances I can probably do but little, I shall do all I can to help elect him. Republicans will now quit contending among themselves and turn all their guns on the common enemy."

CONGRATULATIONS FROM HUGHES.

Albany, June 18.—Gov. Hughes was at the executive chamber when the nomination of Secy. Taft as the Republican candidate for president was conveyed to him. He had no comment to make, but announced that he would send the following telegram to Mr. Taft:

"I heartily congratulate you upon your nomination. Under your administration the welfare of the country will be assured. (Signed) "CHARLES E. HUGHES."

NO COMMENT FROM BRYAN.

Lincoln, Neb., June 18.—William J. Bryan received the news of the action of the Republican national convention at his Fairview home this afternoon and evening, and was especially interested in the result. The nomination of Secy. Taft was so apparent that it, of course, occasioned no surprise. Mr. Bryan asked to be told the vote on other candidates and was especially interested in that for Senator La Follette. He said he had no comment to make on the convention's work, but would soon, probably tomorrow, prepare a statement of his views on the Republican platform.

FILIPINOS LIKE HIM.

Manila, June 18.—An Associated Press bulletin conveyed to the people of the Philippines the first news of the nomination of Secy. of War Taft for president by the Republican national convention. The news, which was rapidly circulated early this morning in the newspaper extras, was generally received with intense gratification. Scores of cablegrams of congratulation were started toward Washington. There is a strong personal note in the feeling of satisfaction of Americans and Filipinos because of the wide acquaintance and personal popularity of Secy. Taft in the belief that his political career had its beginning here. A leading American expressed the general attitude when he said:

"The hopes of the Philippines rest largely in Taft. No other American statesman knows the islands of the orient as well as he. Our strongest hope of ultimate justice lies through Taft."

WHAT LA FOLLETTE SAYS.

Chicago, June 18.—A dispatch from Madison to the Tribune, says: Senator La Follette last night sent the following telegram to Mr. Taft on hearing of his nomination by the convention at Chicago:

"Hon. Wm. H. Taft, Washington, D. C.—While the platform is disappointing in some fundamental provisions and omissions and I shall claim the right to say so, I congratulate you most sincerely and in the faith that you are more clearly in accord with the great body of Republicans in the United States platform. I shall do all in my power to insure your election."

BELLE GUINNESS AND CHILDREN BURIED

Chicago, June 17.—The bodies of Mrs. Belle Guinness and three children, who lost their lives in the destruction of the Guinness farm house at Laporte, Ind., April 28, arrived in Chicago today in charge of Frank L. Cutler and were buried in Forest Home cemetery. The bodies were received by an undertaker, who with a businesslike air and without formalities, loaded them into his vehicles, conveyed them to the city hall, where burial permits were secured, and then to the cemetery for burial.

NEW HAMBURG STEAMERS.

New York, June 18.—Emil Boas, general manager in America of the Hamburg-American line, has returned from a hurried trip to Europe. He volunteered the information that there will be two new vessels of the line here next season, to be named the Cincinnati and Cleveland. They will be of 18,500 tons register, with a speed of 16 knots an hour. They are being built in Hamburg.

USING UP DYNAMITE.

Washington, June 18.—Vast quantities of dynamite are to be used on the Illinois canal work during the next fiscal year, according to estimates by the division engineers. Over 5,000 tons of the explosive, it is thought, will be required and nearly 64 per cent of it will be for the use of the Cuba division. One division, the Chagres will use 30 per cent dynamite, which is regarded as a sufficient percentage of strength for medium rock. The plan is to keep only three months supply of the explosive on the isthmus at one time, thus lessening the danger and loss in case of explosion.

CANAL ZONE SANITATION.

Washington, June 18.—On the whole, sanitary progress in the canal zone has been very satisfactory during May, according to the monthly report of C. C. McCulloch, Jr., acting chief sanitary officer.

Taking the total population of Panama, Colon and the canal zone, there was a marked falling off in the death rate per thousand during May this year, as compared with 1907, when it was 31.57. May this year it was 20.87 per thousand.

MINORITY LEADER WILLIAMS RESIGNS

Should Democrats Carry House Prospective Speaker Ought to Have Preliminary Training.

IS NECESSARY IN ANY EVENT.

Hopes Federal Usurpation of Power Has Seen Its Height and is Now on the Ebb.

Burlingame, Ala., June 18.—Announcement of the resignation of Congressman John Sharp Williams from the minority leadership of the house was made today by Congressman H. D. Clayton, chairman of the Democratic caucus. Mr. Williams, in a letter to Mr. Clayton, declares that his retirement is actuated solely by the belief that it is best for the party. Mr. Williams' letter, dated Washington, June 18, says:

"I write this letter to you, as my resignation of the position of the parliamentary floor leader of the minority, the resignation to take place on the first Monday of December following this date. I have been thinking about it a good deal, and it seems to me that if the next house goes Democratic, whoever is going to be speaker of that house ought to have at least the training of the last or short session of this Congress, not only to fit him for his parliamentary duties, but also to make him acquainted with the personnel of the Democratic side, that he otherwise might not have. If, upon the other hand, the next house shall be Republican, the preliminary training will be just as necessary in order to fit for the arduous duty of leadership during the Sixty-first Congress.

"I have not consulted any of my friends about resigning, for fear they might attempt to dissuade me, and my opinion of the absolute correctness of the position which I am taking is so clear that I did not want either to dissuade or to appear obstinate toward them.

"As you and some personal friends know, I would, because of the condition of my health, have laid down the work before this, but for the appearance of 'quitting while under fire.' I would not, however, permit the prospect of the work alone make me quit, if that were so I am sure I have been with the idea that the course is best for the party.

"In sending in the resignation this early, so you can have it published, instead of waiting until next December, I have been actuated by the idea that it was fair only to the members of the party that they should have time between now and then fully to consider whom they wanted to succeed me.

"If the next campaign could be fought simply upon the issues made in this last session of Congress, I would have no sort of doubt of Democratic success. No matter what the issues may be and how things will turn out, we will have the recollection of having stood shoulder to shoulder with one another, and we can now with great reason entertain strong hope of Democratic governmental reformation. Whether we earn success at the polls next November or not, we have decided it, and that is all that poor mortals can do. They cannot compel fate. I sincerely hope and express the hope to you and to the Democratic caucus that the tide of centralization and of federal usurpation of governmental power has seen its height and is now on the ebb."

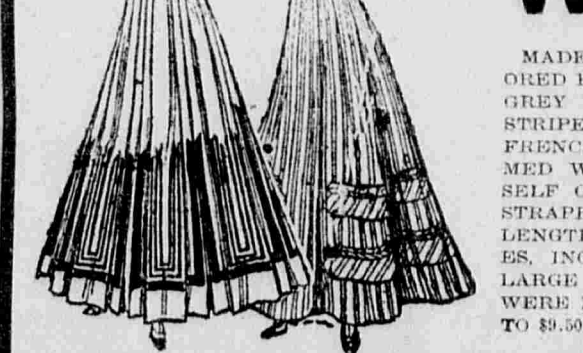
