PRESIDENT MUCH PLEASED.

Hughes and Cannon Send Congratulatory Mersages-Foraker in Line-Bryan Has Nothing to Say.

Washington, June 18 .- "Words do not And themselves at a time like this. I do not deny that I am very happy.' This was the response of Secy. William H. Taft to a request for an expression of his views on his nomination for the presidency. The sentences did not come easily. Throughout the afternoon preceding the announcement of his nomination the secretary had been laboring under suppressed nervous tension. The atmosphere of his office was electric with excitement. Notwith-standing the great personal interest which he had in the proceedings at Chicago, a thousands miles away, Secy. Taft did not permit politics to interfere for a moment with his transaction of official business as secretary of war. In the intermissions between bulletins from the convention the secretary dis-posed of several important departmen-tal questions, and when his nomination for the presidency was announced his been laboring under suppressed nervous tal questions, and when his nomination for the presidency was announced his desk practically was cleared of import-funt official business. Throughout the afternoon the private office of Secy, Taft and the office of his private sec-retary, Frederick Carpenter, were thronged with members of his family, intimate personal and official friends and newspaper men.

USING UP DYNAMITE.

USING UP DYNAMITE. Washington, June 19.-Vast quanti-ties of dynamite are to be used on isthmian canal work during the next facal year, according to estimates by the division engineers. Over 5,600 tons of the explosive, it is thought will be required and nearly 64 per cent of it will be for the use of the Culebra div-ision. One division, the Chagres will use 30 per cent dynamite, which is re-garded as a sufficient percentage of strength for medium rack. The plan is to keep only three months supply of the explosive on the 1sthmus at one time, thus lessening the danger and loss in case of explosion. in case of explosion.
