Cohn's Anti-Fort Douglas Railway Reservation Killed.

TOUGH-LODGE CATCH RABINS.

Board of Public Works Report on the New Jail Muddle—Appropriation and Adjustment.

The Council, at its meeting last night, had a brief discussion on the Fort Douglas resolution, which was reported upon adversely by the committee on cities, notwithstanding the fact that this is the second time that it has been before them.

PESTILENCE AND CONSTITUTIONS.

David F. Walker called the attention of the Council to the bill introduced by the members of the Anti-Government party in the House for the reason that their friends were trying to stifle it, reported adversely on the floor.

Mr. Clegg was asked permission to present a private bill with reference to sanitary purposes with his residence on Main street near Capital grounds. Committee on waterworks.

Rydin H. Hayes asked damages to the sum of \$1,000 caused by his property on Second West and Third North by the bursting of the gravity sewer. This is the second time that petition has been before the Council, they having rejected adversely on it previously. Referred to committee on sewers.

J. W. Maynard asked that Fort Street be brought to proper grade. Committee on streets.

George H. Gray et al asked that Fifth West be graded. Committee on streets.

J. W. Farrell & Co. asked that two lots be taken off the southwest corner of their claim, amounting to 100x100, to be granted to them.

MEMBERS OF CITY COUNCIL.

The only change noted permission to James G. Young, George L. Grant, Young et al to have water of the Fort and Diamond streets to assist in the working of oil. It is proposed to increase the flow of water in these streets.

The city attorney recommended that James G. Young be removed from the office of city engineer and the east half of town, part 2. Adopted.

The city attorney presented a report of the expenses of the government for the month of August, 1895, as follows:

REMOVAL OF CAPITAL TAXES.

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Reinstatement of Waterworks. The city engineer submitted a report to the department on the water main between Fifth and Sixth West streets, and said that same was caused by the attachment of electric wire to main, which raised the pressure in the main so much that it burst. It was suggested that attaching wires to the main should be discontinued.

James G. Young said that the unwise practice was creating too much pressure in the main, and thought that same would be caused by leaving them attached.

The city attorney recommended that James G. Young be removed from the office of city engineer and the east half of town, part 2. Adopted.
