OFFICIAL FREIGHT CLASSIFICATION.

Changes Affecting Several Hundred Articles Are Adopted.

REVISION OF SCHEDULE.

Another Practically New Provision Which Affects Packing House Products and Other Articles.

New York, Dec. 10.—Changes in the official freight classification affecting several hundred articles, have been adopted by the trunk line railroads and will take effect on January 1. The classification committee of the trunk lines some time ago took up the annual revision of the schedule. The work has now been completed and the classification will soon be made public. Most of the changes do not alter the previous classification; they consist principally of the addition or elimination of specifications as to how the merchandise affected shall be packed, etc., of changes in the minimum carload weights, and of the application of certain new rules. All of these changes, however, result in a greater or less extent, to the rate. This is "special," true of the new rule which governs the charges to be made on carload shipments, according to the length of the car. This regulation, it is claimed, was put in the classification so as to yield a larger revenue to the railroads on such shipments. To illustrate, when the minimum carload weight provided in the classification is, say 20,000 pounds, and a car 35 feet long is loaded with 20,000 pounds of goods, the rate for not less than 20,000 pounds will be for not less than 20,000 pounds and so on. Many articles have been made subject to this rule, among the agricultural implements and parts thereof, apple or fruit barrels, chairs, corks and cork wood, herry crates, cranberries and coolers, traction engines, firebricks and kites, furniture and vehicles.

Another practically new provision which affects packing house products and other articles, is as follows: "When any of the following specified articles are shipped by one packer or owner at one time to one consignee and destination in either straight or mixed carloads, and the aggregate weight of the entire shipment is 25,000 pounds or more, the railroad rate for 25,000 pounds on each article shall be charged."

That follows the list of articles affected such as beef and pork and products thereof, herry crates, cranberries and coolers, traction engines, firebricks and kites, furniture and vehicles.

ANOTHER COMBINATION.

Story of a Pennsylvania-Rock Island-San Pedro Understanding.

The Denver papers continue their "unearthing of mysteries" in the railroad line, although they have apparently by this time, through the investigation of these parties, the rule continues. The Times has a new story to the effect that the Pennsylvania and Rock Island have solidified into a brand new transcontinental combination. The new combination was brought out by the recent move whereby President Purdy resigned to be succeeded by W. B. Leeds, representative of the Pennsylvania, and J. H. Moore and J. H. Moore and J. H. Moore, both Pennsylvania men, also have been chosen to the directory and executive committee respectively. The Times further remarks: "The rapidity with which the extension southwest from Liberal, Kan., to a connection with the El Paso and North-eastern was but was considered another to a desire to connect with the Southern Pacific for southern California and Mexico business until now. But the new president of the Rock Island is said to be in close relations with the Pennsylvania. Any other articles and goods & Salt Lake road in forming a transcontinental system beside which other community interest combinations would sink into insignificance. It would make the first complete transcontinental system in the United States, though the idea has been a dream of every railway magnate in America."

The belief is strengthened by the fact that the Pennsylvania Development company, formerly an auxiliary of the Pennsylvania Railroad company, was awarded the contract to build the Fe Central railroad from San Pedro on the Rio Grande north of Santa Fe and almost an air line to a connection with the Clark road in southern Utah. This contract is for 16 miles of road. Surveyors supposed to represent the same company are working westward from Chamonien, while engineers of the Clark road are working east from the present survey of that line in Beaver county, Utah.

HARRIMAN CONFERENCE.

Officials of Roads Interested Meet in Short Line Offices.

There was a conference Saturday afternoon between General Manager Dickinson and Master of Transportation E. Buckingham of the Union Pacific, General Manager W. H. Barnhart and General Superintendent E. E. Calvin of the Short Line and Superintendent J. P. O'Brien and Assistant M. J. Buckley of the O. R. & N., when it was decided to adopt, with some changes, the American Railway association's code of rules for the operation of the three lines represented. One of the changes thus brought about is that the white light is to be used in the case of a safety signal. The reason for this is that white lights are so common that they are often the occasion of confusion, when a green color can never be mistaken for anything else than a railway signal. Then when a red light is broken in a switch lamp even if the switch is turned to show danger, the white light showing through where the red glass has been broken out, is misleading. Messrs. Dickinson and Buckingham registered at the Knutsford.

ORDER AMERICAN ENGINES.

Directors of Leading English Road Adopt Uncle Sam's Methods.

New York, Dec. 10.—According to the London correspondence of the Tribune, the directors of the Northeastern railway have not only adopted the American form of gathering statistics, but

also appears that they have given an order for twenty American locomotives.

SPIKE AND RAIL.

General Manager Russell Harding of the Missouri Pacific is inspecting the Rio Grande lines, and is expected in Salt Lake this week.

A Pocotello railroad official says that the contracts for the new Pocotello shops have really been let, and that contractors are expected there this week.

Eastern freight agents who have been cutting rates, now find themselves unable to secure cars to carry the cut-rate goods West, and have in consequence got themselves into a peck or trouble.

General Manager G. W. Holdridge of the Burlington is in Denver, and denies that there will be any change in the running time of the road between Denver and Chicago, although the Santa Fe and the Union Pacific are preparing to shorten their time between Chicago and San Francisco. It will be interesting in the way of reminiscence to remark that Mr. Holdridge is a Harvard '93 graduate, and was now on the Harvard four-oared crew that was sent to England that year to pull against Oxford.
