

BLUE JACKETS IN GREAT PARADE

Five Thousand of Them and
Marines Land from Fleet and
March Through San Diego.

PROCESSION TWO MILES LONG

Royal Welcome Touches Hearts of the
Men of the Sea, and is
Deeply Appreciated.

San Diego, Cal., April 15.—A parade of blue jackets and marines landed from the American battleship fleet—5,000 fighting men fresh from a cruise of more than 13,000 miles—marked today the ceremonies of official welcome to the state of California. Sixty-four companies of sailors in their toga of the sea, with wide-flaring trousers reefed down in canvas leggings, and 16 companies of marines, solidly and straight, formed this most notable of the navy's land displays. The landing party, equipped as infantry, armed with Krags, in light marching order and with canteens filled, equalled an army corps. The procession the men of the navy formed was more than two miles long. They marched from the waterfront to the city park over three miles of streets canopied with decorations which combined the red, white and blue of the nation and the gold and white of the state. San Diego took a holiday to see the martial pageant, and the sidewalks paralleling the asphalted roadway were crowded with a mixed holiday throng. The school children waving flags and banners were massed directly in front of the reviewing stand, and their songs and cheers were one of the most brilliant features of the day's celebration.

Gov. Gillett, in a brief speech, supplemented his words of welcome spoken yesterday on the quarter deck of the flagship Connecticut, and Rear-Admiral Charles M. Thomas made formal response in behalf of the fleet. He declared the celebration without the presence of Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans was very much like Hamlet with Hamlet out of the play. He regretted the absence of the commander-in-chief of the fleet, and then graciously accepted in his behalf a golden key symbolical of the freedom of the city. Admiral Thomas said:

"The Governor of California and Fellow Citizens—It is with extreme pleasure that I, on behalf of the commander-in-chief, who, most unfortunately, is not able to be with us on this interesting occasion, and on behalf of my brother officers of the fleet, return to you, sir, as the chief magistrate of this imperial state of California, the Golden State, and one of the brightest gems in the brilliant crown of the Union, our most profound thanks for the cordial and loving welcome that you have given to the magnificent fleet that we have the great honor and pride to represent.

"In the midst of these welcoming ceremonies, there is one sincere source of regret to us of the fleet, and I am sure that I may add to all within the reach of my voice, and that is the enforced absence of our able and respected commander-in-chief, together with the reason thereof.

"Wherever this fleet appears without its chief, it is very much like presenting the play of Hamlet, with the character of Hamlet omitted.

"In opening my remarks on this occasion, after addressing his excellency the governor, I added 'and fellow citizens.' You little know what joy that one expression 'fellow citizens' gives to the hearts of us all, and especially so after a long journey of nearly 14,000 miles, and it means a great deal. It means 'home-coming,' and the return to what we of the navy invariably designate 'God's own country.'

"San Diego is our first home port after leaving Hampton Roads on Dec. 16 last, and your royal welcome has indeed touched our hearts deeply, yet, very deeply, and we return to you our most grateful thanks and appreciation."

The golden key will be forwarded by Admiral Thomas to Admiral Evans. There will go with it a gold mounted and jeweled naval sword presented today to Admiral Evans, through Admiral Thomas, by the patriotic fraternalists of the city, including the Grand Army of the Republic, the Confederate Veterans and Spanish War Veterans. To Admirals Thomas, Sperry and Emory, gold medals commemorative of their visit were presented, and there also was a medal for Capt. R. R. Ingersoll, who served as chief of staff to Admiral Evans from Hampton Roads to Magdalena Bay, the

INDEPENDENCE TEMPLE LOT.

Hedrickites Hold it and Are Opposed To Selling It.

Kansas City, April 15.—That the sacred "Temple Lot" at Independence, Mo., is in the hands of men who firmly reject all overtures of the various branches of Mormonism, was made evident today at the session of the general conference of the Re-organized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The lot, which lies just across the street from the meetinghouse of the Re-organized church, is owned by the "Hedrickites," a little faction of Mormons who call themselves "The Church of Christ." This was a church, founded and consecrated by Joseph Smith, the first prophet, 75 years ago, and was regarded as the site of a future glorious temple to the Lord. After years of litigation which started when the "Hedrickites" left the Mormon Church, they obtained possession of the property and have kept it without dispute to their claim for about 20 years. The property is worth from \$15,000 to \$20,000 but it is the general opinion that the "Hedrickites" could get \$1,000,000 for it. It should they offer to dispose of it. It is understood that the Latter-day Saints have been trying to secure possession of the site for years.

GOLD FOR EUROPE.

New York, April 15.—The first engagement of the gold shipment to Europe since the financial panic of October last was announced today, the National City bank taking \$1,000,000 for Paris. The shipment is due to a rise in exchange rates in New York and a decline in sterling in Paris. FINED FOR VIOLATING THE PURE FOOD LAW

Washington, April 15.—As a result of the first conviction under the pure food and drugs law, N. Harper, president of the Washington chamber of commerce, formerly president of the American National bank, a drug manufacturer, and one of the best known business men of this city, was today sentenced by Judge Kimball in the police court to pay a fine of \$500 on one count to \$200 on another count of the indictment recently returned against him for manufacturing and selling a mislabeled pharmaceutical compound. President Roosevelt had insisted that the prosecution demand a jail sentence.

The compound, which brought the Harper prosecution, was called a headache remedy, alleged to contain antipyrine, acetanilid, caffeine, alcohol and other ingredients. Testimony was offered that an overdose would have a fatal effect.

President Roosevelt on March 16 summoned Dist. Atty. Baker to the White House and directed him to press for a jail sentence for Harper, in order that the first convicted violator of the pure food law should suffer the extreme penalty.

Judge Kimball said that as this was the first offense against the pure food and drugs act he would not impose a jail sentence. Owing to the seriousness of the offense, Judge Kimball said he would impose the maximum money penalty.

Following the sentence, a bill of exceptions was filed by Harper's attorneys and an appeal taken to the district court of appeals.

The court's sentence named five months' imprisonment in the district jail as an alternative in default of payment of the fine.

M'CARREN WAS STORM CENTER

After Hard Fight Kings County
Democratic Leader Unseated
As Delegate to Convention

PARKER LEADS DELEGATION.

Bryan Leader Walker Threatens to
Call Another Convention to Send
Protesting Delegation to Denver.

New York, April 15.—State Senator Patrick H. McCarren, leader of the King's county Democracy, was unseated tonight as a delegate to the party's state convention in Carnegie hall to select national representatives to the Denver national convention, after a two-days' bitter contest before the committee on credentials. He was alternately greeted with cheers and derisive cries when he finally addressed the convention, and once was insulted by a man on the platform near him. The senator told this man he would talk to him outside the hall. Amid scenes tense and dramatic in the extreme he first appealed to the convention to refuse the sanction of the majority report of those who, he said, were excluding him from the place in the party councils to which he had been chosen by his Democratic constituents. He threatened the Tammany delegates with the statement that if the plans to put him outside the party lines were carried out no one in the convention hall would live long enough to see the election of another Democratic mayor of New York City.

The senator's speech was attended by unusual and picturesque circumstances. From the time he entered the hall he received the cheers of his loyal followers, but the majority was against him, and the counter demonstrations were greater in volume. He made his fight calmly and courageously, notwithstanding the much disorder and confusion, in which both the McCarren men and their opponents participated. The two days' waiting for the committee's report affected the delegates, and they showed the strain during the long roll call on the adoption of the majority report.

The business for which the convention was assembled, the selection of delegates to the national convention, the nomination of president and vice president, and the adoption of a platform, was almost forgotten in the excitement over the McCarren contest.

When the vote was announced McCarren, with his followers, arose and left the hall, while their friends in the gallery gave them a parting cheer. Another cheer greeted Bird S. Coler of Kings, as he asked his fellow delegates to support the McCarren men.

Senator McCarren said that he would carry his fight to the Denver convention. After the settlement of the McCarren and other contests, the convention proceeded with its task, and named delegates and electors, and adopted a platform, which was the subject of much discussion.

We hold that Democratic traditions, bound up as they are with much that is greatest in the history of the country, require that national elections be conducted in the most honest and intelligent, the ripest judgment, and the most unselfish patriotism of the party for the purpose of studying the needs and striving for the welfare of the country at large.

"And, therefore, we, representing the party in the greatest state of the Union, a state whose electoral vote is essential to Democratic victory, with no animosity or hostility for any candidate, and animated only by devotion to the principles of the party, call upon the Democracy of the country to send to Denver in July next, unpledged, unfettered and uninstructed, their ablest, strongest and most representative men, to meet and that out of the deliberation and consultation of such men there may be then and there nominated a ticket which will rally to its support the judgment, conscience and vote of a majority of the citizens of the country."

Alton B. Parker, New York; Charles F. Murphy, New York; Louis Nixon, New York, and Charles Froeh, Brooklyn, were chosen delegates-at-large.

A resolution that the delegates to the national convention be instructed to adopt the unit rule was adopted.

After the platform had been adopted and the delegates named, a scene of wild disorder followed the announcement of the names of the new state committee. Delegates from several districts protested that the names read were not those selected. The chairman replied that the question was whether the convention, through its own committee, should be empowered to name the new state committee. The aisles were crowded with delegates denouncing the proposition. Order could not be restored, the delegates refusing to be seated, and the police for many minutes were powerless to keep them quiet. It was then past midnight, and the excitement was greater than during the McCarren incident. At the height of the disturbance the sergeant-at-arms was knocked from the platform. The committee's report was finally carried.

Harry W. Walker, one of Bryan's most enthusiastic supporters in New York, declared he would issue a call for another state convention to send a protesting delegation to Denver. The convention adjourned at 12:30.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

Jealous Lover Kills Girl Because His Rival Was Successful.

Portland, Or., April 16.—A special to the Oregonian from Marshfield, Or., states that John Eillis last night shot and killed Ora Roby, then turning the gun upon himself ended his own life. Eillis had been paying his attentions to the girl and attended a dance with her last night.

Eillis is about 23 years old, and had been away from Marshfield several weeks. Returning, he learned that Miss Roby had been receiving attentions from another young man, and that the latter's suit was successful. This is supposed to be the cause of the deed.

AUSTRIAN JEW THREATENED PORTLAND JEW

Portland, April 16.—State Senator Sigmund Siegel, one of the most prominent Jewish residents of Portland, and president of the Congregation Emanuel, has been threatened with death of himself and family unless he complied with a demand for \$400, made on him by a man who gives the name of Adolph Adler, an Austrian Jew.

Adler, who was arrested, admits his act, and declares he was the unwilling emissary of a secret society, but who composes the society or anything about the alleged organization the detectives who are working on the case are unable to learn.

Adler threatened himself at Siegel's tobacco store yesterday afternoon and handed a letter to him. Siegel was amazed to learn from the document, which was written in English, that unless he gave the money \$400 to "aid the suffering Jews," that he and his family would "suffer punishment to the death."

Siegel talked with the man for a few minutes and told him to come back later. In the meantime the authorities were informed of the case and when the alleged anarchist reappeared he was arrested.

INDIAN FIGURES.

Bill Introduced in Oklahoma Legislature to Prohibit Use as Cigar Signs.

Chicago, April 16.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Guthrie, Okla. says: Senator Landrum, a Cherokee Indian, introduced a bill yesterday prohibiting the use of Indian figures as cigar or tobacco signs. The bill is certain to pass and branches of the legislature and become a law, as all political parties consider the large Indian vote to hold the balance of power.

The bill provides a fine of \$50 and six months' imprisonment for any person who uses an Indian figure, no matter for what purpose, or who has such figures in his possession.

METALIZING HUMAN BODY

X-Ray Expert Fuchs Discovered Method Which His Brother Perfected After His Death.

Chicago, April 16.—The International X-ray expert, Dr. Fuchs, who died a year ago with "X-ray cancer," a martyr to science, discovered a marvelous secret by which he was able to work certain chemical changes in living organisms that transform them into metal. For two years before his death he conducted a series of experiments, which reached their climax in the metallization of his nose, one of the Reinhard D. Fuchs, his brother, took up the work where he left off and brought the secret process to practical perfection. Mr. Fuchs is planning to metallize a human body, which he proposes to put on exhibition in a downtown shop window. The body will be that of a pauper. By the secret process of metallization it will be changed into a statue which, to all external appearances, will be of solid gold. The cost of this strange conversion of a human corpse into metal, according to the inventor's estimate, will be \$500.

PATROLMAN KILLS ROBBER.

Portland, Or., April 16.—After a hold series of robberies on both sides of Willamette river last night, in which three men held up pedestrians and cashiers, Patrolman Charles D. Henson shot and killed Eddie E. Eddy, one of the robbers, and was in turn wounded by a fusillade of shots from the highwayman. Another of the robbers, Fritz Rathke, was wounded by Patrolman S. D.
