IN THE CHURCH CASES.

The following dispatch appears in this morning's Herald and explanatory:

Washington, May 13.—In the Supreme Court this morning ex-Senator McDonald filed an appli-cation asking for time in which to file a petition for rehearing of the Church property confiscation cases. He stated that Colonel Broadhead was not here, but at his home in St. Louis, and requested the necessary time for consultation and preparation of a petition alleging that he belived that good reasons could be shown why such rehearing should be had. The chief justice said he had received a telegram from Colonel Broadhead, making the same request, which the court had same request, which the court mu considered, and granted till Thurs-day for the filing of such pe-tition. McDonald subsequently applied to Justice Bradley for a copy of the opinion in the case, so that he might examine the text taking any action Justice it before taking any action. Justice Bratley wrote in answer that he had some corrections to make, hoping to he able to let him, McDonald, have it by Wednesday. As the court required the petition for hearing to be filed Thursday, this action virtually amounts to a denial, as the time will hardly permit the promul-gation of such a petition as the importance of the issue demands. Senator McDouald has learned by telegraph from Colonel Broadhead that it will be impossible for him to reach Washington in time to render any service in the case.
