North side of First South Street, commencing 120 feet west of the west line of West Temple Street, thence west to Fourth West Street.

East side of West Temple Street, between South Temple Street and First South Street.

West side of West Temple Street, between South Temple Street and a point 132 feet north of the north line of First South Street.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

South side of First South Street, from First East Street to a point 330 feet east from the east line of First East Street and from Second to Seventh East streets.

North side of First South Street, commencing 111 feet east of the east line of First East Street, thence east to Seventh East Street.

East side of First East Street, between South Temple and First South streets.

West side of First East Street, between South Temple Street and a point fifty eight feet north of the north line of First South Street.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

North side of Second South Street, between West Temple and Fifth West streets.

South side of Second South Street, from West Temple Street to a point 165 feet west of the west line of West Temple Street.

South side of Second South Street, from a point 221 feet west of west line of West Temple Street, to Fifth West Street.

Both sides of West Temple Street between First and Second South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

North side of Second South Street, between First and Seventh East streets.

South side of Second South Street, between First and Fourth East streets.

Both sides of First East Street, between First and Second South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

North side of Third South Street, between West Temple and Third West streets.

South side of Third South Street, between East Temple and Second West streets.

Both sides of West Temple Street, between Second and Third South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

Both sides of Third South Street, between East Temple and Fourth East streets.

Both sides of First East Street, between Second and Fourth South streets.

East side of East Temple Street, between Third and Fourth South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 7.

West side of East Temple Street, between Third and Seventh South streets.

Both sides of West Temple Street, between Third and Sixth South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 8.

East side of East Temple Street, between Fourth and Seventh South streets.

Both sides of First East Street, between Fourth and Sixth South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 9.

Both sides of First West Street, between South Temple and Fourth South streets.

DISTRICT NO. 10.

East side of Commercial Street, between First and Second South streets.

West side of Commercial Street, commencing at a point 192 feet south of south line of First South Street, thence south to Second South Street.

DISTRICT NO. 11.

Both sides of East Temple Street, between North Temple and First North streets.

And that the sidewalks be constructed six inches in thickness. The lower five inches to be of concrete, the upper one inch to be of cement, and that they have a uniform width of eight feet. The best English Portland cement to be used throughout. And wherever sidewalks are constructed on both sides of the street in said district, that cross-walks of flagging and cobble stone be constructed to connect them.

A careful estimate of the cost of constructing said sidewalks and crossings, including grading, flagging and engineering, is as follows:

Mr. Parsons was the solitary supporter of Mr. Cohn.

The vote was Parsons 9, Cohn 1. Mayor Scott reported that he had appointed Horace Heath, H. L. Glenn, James Saunders and Wm. A. Sydney mounted police. The appointments were confirmed.

Mr. Spafford said he had been informed that employes at Liberty Park had been guilty of insulting ladies who were visiting the park.

The mayor said that if the assertion was true and the guilty ones could be discovered, they would be discharged.

The mayor reported that he had appointed Frank M. Glenn a policeman, in place of D. B. Carson. Referred to the committee on police.

IN THE CHURCH CASES.

The following dispatch appears in this morning's *Herald* and explanatory:

Washington, May 13.—In the Supreme Court this morning ex-Senator McDonald filed an application asking for time in which to file a petition for rehearing of the Church property confiscation cases. He stated that Colonel Broadhead was not here, but at his home in St. Louis, and requested the necessary time for consultation and preparation of a petition alleging that he believed that good reasons could be shown why such rehearing should be had. The chief justice said he had received a telegram from Colonel Broadhead, making the same request, which the court had considered, and granted till Thursday for the filing of such petition. Mr. McDonald subsequently applied to Justice Bradley for a copy of the opinion in the case, so that he might examine it before taking any action. Justice Bradley wrote in answer that he had some corrections to make, hoping to be able to let him, McDonald, have it by Wednesday. As the court required the petition for hearing to be filed Thursday, this action virtually amounts to a denial, as the time will hardly permit the promulgation of such a petition as the importance of the issue demands. Senator McDonald has learned by telegraph from Colonel Broadhead that it will be impossible for him to reach Washington in time to render any service in the case.

In Paris, last year, 16,940 horses, 241 donkeys, and 43 mules were slaughtered for food, two thirds of the meat being used for sausages. Horseflesh is sold at 132 shops in the city, and is rising in price. In England horseflesh has a large sale, but statistics are lacking on account of the secrecy with which it is conducted. At Manchester large quantities are sold at twenty shops in the city, and at Salford horseflesh is sold at about twelve shops.
