While this will leave each county still under the direction of one management and committee with the necessary, which formerly existed, of the central board consulting each other individually.

For the purpose of carrying out this scheme, the association officers have nominated committees for several counties, whose duty it is to call a meeting of the millers to come to the last method of co-operating, and to report results in time to be considered at the directors' meeting on the 15th of August next. The chairman of the board are: For Box Elder and Cache counties, Joseph Mack.

Morgan and Weber counties, Joseph Clark. For Salt Lake and Davis counties, Alexander Rogers.

Wasatch and Sevier counties, J. E. Becker. For Lake county, Idaho, and Uinta county, Wyoming, J. E. Cassin.

The millers' union, of the counties named are invited to join with them in the county named to them.

Whether or not this scheme can be successfully carried out remains to be seen. Some of the millers are confident that it can. Others who realize that the association has been of material advantage already say that the cause which overthrew the association will be the way to success of the new move.

Under the circumstances the partly perfected big consolidation scheme again comes to the front. In procedure and history up to the date when the millers were permitted to test their own strength in the new scheme, it is now revived and is being again discussed. If carried forward as at present intended it will involve eleven or twelve of the largest and best equipped mill flour mills in the northern part of the Territory. These will be operated under one management for mutual benefit and in competition against all others. It is believed that under this plan the millers in the mountains can be run at the lowest possible cost to each.

The millers are agreed upon one point, viz: that something should be done at once in the new scheme with some competition and thus prevent the granting of the market at various prices and needless expense. What the method of procedure will be in attaining this end is a matter of uncertainty. The meeting of August 15th may throw some light on the subject.

On a Promissory Note.

In the Third district court last evening A. F. Schneider brought suit against Ben W. Briggs Jr., Milande Pratt and Orville P. Pratt to collect \$1000 on a promissory note, with interest. Complaint alleges that on February 10, 1893, the defendants jointly and severally gave their note for \$1000, payable two years after date, with interest at 5 per cent per annum, to one William H. Lyndon. Lyndon sold the note to the plaintiff for valuable consideration, and as the note is unpaid though due a promissory note, the plaintiff prays for judgment on the note and interest.

HOW THE CITY BUYS LUMBER.

An illustration of how the business affairs of the city are managed.

A peculiar piece of business, dating from the time of the city's incorporation, is the buying of lumber by the city. It is done over a long bill of lumber purchased by the city's department. It appears, according to the financial statement, that the lumber is of the most ordinary kind, such as is used in the construction of the city's buildings.

A further investigation of the matter will be made. UNFORTUNATE G. C. WHITMORE.

He has been again arrested for alleged contempt of court.

Banker George C. Whitmore of Nephi is beginning to realize that "contempt" proceedings are both a troublesome and expensive item of sport. Only a couple of weeks ago, in the suit in which L. Scott Elliott was plaintiff, he was required by Judge Harbo, who is a practical investigator, to replace a new dress which he had willfully removed in defiance of the court's order, and on that matter an appeal is now pending. The land on which the building, extending to the river, is situated in Kanab county, at a place distant some fifteen miles from Hatch, and reached by wagon road from the railway station there. The distance from Salt Lake City is 155 miles.

It would appear that since the case was last before the court, Mr. Whitmore has again similarly transgressed, it being now charged that he has deliberately diverted the water running through the dam in question, and therefore a warrant was served out against him by Attorney C. B. Varley (counsel for L. Scott Elliott) the early part of this week. His service was executed by Deputy Marshal Roman Cannon, who arrested Mr. Whitmore at his ranch beyond Panguitch on Tuesday and brought him to this city last night.

The defendant has been released, however, on a bond of \$1000, and the hearing set for Wednesday next.

Brown and Henderson will defend, as on the previous occasion.
