A sheaf of wheat nearly six fact

A sheaf of wheat nearly six fact tall and bearing heads fully five inches long, was brought to the "News" today by Joseph J. Giles of Provo. The grain was grown at Biggs. Butte county, Cal., in the heart of the Sacramento valley, and near the set-tlement recently formed by Mormon colonists at Gridley. The field from which the specimen was taken is owned by Hon, G. K. Smith, and is three miles long and one and one-fourth miles in width, being about the average of many farms and meadows in that locality. Lands are selling at from \$15 to \$100 per acre. and the region is famous for the quantity and quality of fruit produced. Eight thousand cars of fresh fruit are shipped from the Sacramento valley annually, and much of the best of it is raised at Biggs and Gridley. Crops at the latter place are doing splendidly this season, and a canal has just been apleted for the opening up of new ds.

William Hall of the Lower Mammoth was killed by coming in contact with a live wire on the 1,200-root level. He had been to Finalish Fork during the day and was accompanied by J. J. Banks.
