Mormon Lady Lecturers.—About

the 20th of August, Sister Zina D. Young and Dr. Ellen B. Ferguson, of this city, will start on a tour of the Eastern States, their main object being to give lectures on Utah and her people, and to present the woman's side of the "Mormon" problem, which has been so shamefully and persistently traduced by various unauthorized self-constituted expositors of the system. Under the sanction of the Church authorities, these ladies, who are in every way qualified to impart authentic information upon this important subject, sustained by the prayers and good wishes of their brethren and sisters, are about to go forth to represent the ladies of Utah, so long misrepresented by pseudo champions and pretended well wishers, anxious to gain wealth and notoriety by affecting an interest in their peace and welfare. They will very likely go directly to New York. While absent, Mrs. Young will gather information respecting her family genealogy, in the States of New York and New Hampshire, the homes of her ancestors. Mrs. Ferguson, a medical graduate of 25 years standing, will attend the clinics at Bellevue Hospital, to acquire a knowledge of later improvements in surgery.

Both ladies are well known and highly respected, and are admirably adapted for the duty they have been called upon to perform. Mrs. Young is a widow of the late President Brigham Young, a Latter-day Saint of spotless integrity, a lady of experience and intelligence, and a tried and true mother in Israel. Her companion is a woman of culture and intellectuality, a more recent convert to "Mormonism," but gifted with powers of mind and speech to enable her to aid her sister in defending its principles from the pulpit or the rostrum. The two are well associated, and from among the ladies of Utah, better selections for this purpose, could scarcely have been made. Previous to departing for the east, Dr. Ferguson will deliver a series of lectures in Utah on medical, historical and other subjects, upon which she is amply qualified to discourse. The great good yet to be effected by the ladies of Utah, in assisting to promulgate the gospel, we believe will be foreseen in the results of the prospective efforts of these sisters. May God bless them and crown their labors with success.

Dr. Ferguson's Lecture.—The Ogden Herald says that the lecture given in that city by Dr. Ellen B. Ferguson, of Salt Lake City, on Thursday evening, was but moderately attended, but the audience was remarkably attentive and appreciative. Hon. F. D. Richards introduced the lecturer, who spoke nearly an hour and a half. The subject was treated with marked ability, the introductory portion being devoted to a brief comparison between ancient and modern Rome. After this followed a graphic description of Rome as it is, as seen a few years ago by the lecturer. The details of a visit to the late Pope Pius IX were especially interesting, as were also the remarks on the catenae, and persecutions of the early Christians.

Dr. Ferguson is a pleasing and instructive lecturer, her manner being graceful and her articulation distinct and clear. She purposes before leaving to deliver another lecture in Ogden, exclusively to ladies.

He has been suffering more or less for the past six weeks, yet his indomitable energy kept him up until about a week ago, when he was prostrated by an acute attack of inflammation of the bowels, which finally produced an abscess that caused his death. He died at his residence in this city at one o'clock p.m., to-day.

He was undoubtedly one of the most able men in his line of business that ever drew plans for a building in this city.

He was a native of Canada, but joined the Church in San Francisco, where he was baptized by the late Apostle Parley P. Pratt in early days. He was a quiet, unassuming man, kind and generous in soul, and active in the accomplishment of good. Few were acquainted with him, owing to his natural reticence, but by those who were he was as much beloved for the nobility of his character, as he was admired for his eminent ability.

Among the monuments of his architectural genius, is the beautiful design of the Salt Lake Assembly Hall. Of his private deeds of benevolence and charity, the world will never know the half.

His death is a great loss to the community, which, in common with his host of friends, unite in deeply deploring. The funeral will be held at the late residence of the deceased, 18th Ward, to-morrow (Sunday) at 4 p.m. Friends of the family are invited to attend.

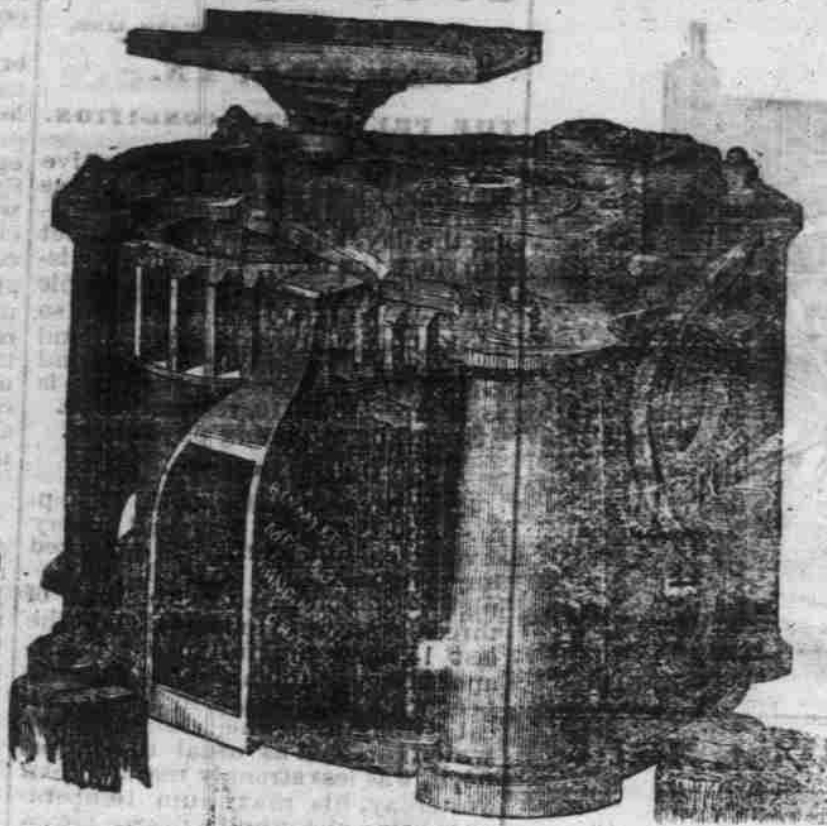

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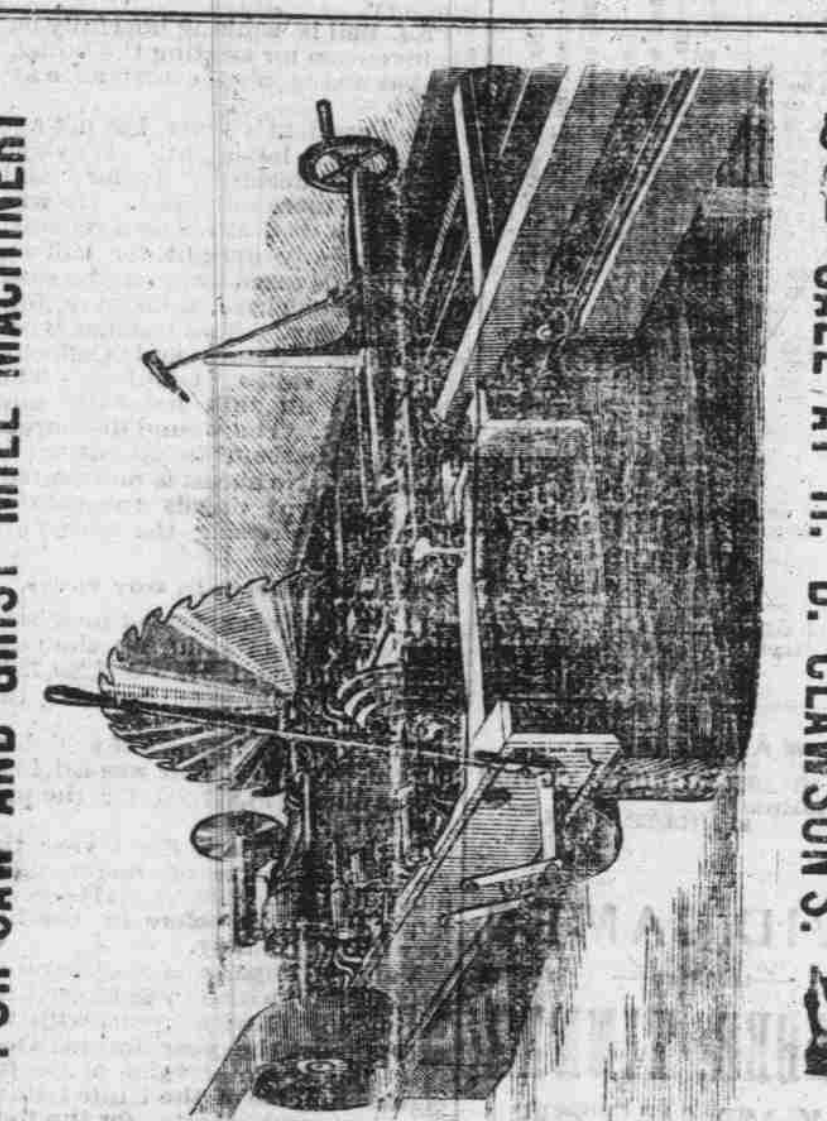
