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A SIMPLE TREATMENT FOR STRIPED FABRICS.

It has a strapped effect laid on the front and back seam, this narrowing at the waistline and broadening toward the shoulder. There are inset pockets on either side, seven-eighths length sleeves and a conventionally tailored collar faced with velvet. The fabric is a brown and mole gray stripe, and with the suit is worn a brown velvet hat trimmed with mole gray feathers, a completing note of the whole scheme being the gloves brown kid boots.
