UNITED STATES INTERNAL REVENUE
TAX.
 THE undersigned would give notice to the public that
 he has been appointed, by the President of the
 United States, Assessor of Taxes, under the Act of Con-
 gress, approved July 1, 1862, entitled an Act to Provide
 Internal Revenue to Support the Government and to pay
 Interest on the Public Debt, for the Collection District,
 comprising the Territory of Utah.
 Agreeable to my instructions from the Commissioner
 of Internal Revenue, I shall aim to appoint, for Assis-
 tant Assessors, persons of business capacity, of well-
 established character for integrity, and of gentlemanly
 bearing, that the law may not, in the manner of its ad-
 ministration, be rendered odious to the people.
 I have arranged the District into Divisions, and shall
 immediately complete the appointments for the Assess-

 people, that they may be prepared to act understand-
 ingly.
