

FINANCIAL CIRCLE IS IN GOOD TONE

Outside Towns Demanding Money
For Improvements Is Regarded With Satisfaction.

DEALS IN LOCAL REALTY.

Holmes Purchase for Proposed Improvement and His Announcement of Further Activity.

The local financial situation remains in good tone, the demand for money is good and the banks are able to accommodate all legitimate demands.

One healthful feature in the demand from outside towns for means to carry on local improvements that makes for the health and comfort of the people in the way of waterworks, electric lights, sewers, etc. In the wider aspects of the case, improvement in business matters is the rule, though there are some expectations; and there has been some reaction from the optimistic feeling engendered by the election of Mr. Wilson, but this reaction will doubtless in time give way to advancement again.

However, the depression was, occasioned by the recent panic, is evidenced by the fact that business fell to 20 per cent of normal, while now it has reacted until it has reached 60 per cent of normal with every promise of continued recovery, unless Congress should pass some radical legislation in regard to the currency, until it is definitely known that the new schedules will be reasonably harmless, recovery from dullness will be slower than it would otherwise have been.

CLEWS' VIEW.

Henry Clews in his last circular

says: "The tendency of values is still at a lower level. This is true of both securities and commodities. Even the stimulating effect of this money is not sufficient to offset this tendency. The metal industries show continued decline because buyers will not take hold until convinced that bottom has been reached. The large percentage of unemployed plant in the steel industry and the absence of new enterprises are conditions, of course, in buyers' favor. Building is less active as regards new projects, and present activity is principally confined to the completion of existing structures.

In various other ways there is the same tendency of quietness; the cotton goods trade being the chief exception. Probably after a few weeks' rest and when tariff uncertainty is removed, there will be a change for the better. Meanwhile activity can only be promoted by allowing values to settle down to the normal, as is natural after a panic. A moderate and general recession would afford the basis for a fresh start as soon as present uncertainties disappear."

REAL ESTATE.

The lumber trade reports adverse conditions in Washington and Oregon because of the prolonged bad weather which in the past few weeks has reduced the output of timber \$0,000,000 fees below what would have been.

This condition has had a perceptible effect on the market, and values are tending upward in fact, though not so rapidly as before than they were in
