**MINE BLOWN IN MAN'S LOG.**

The river at Boise, Idaho, is again rising and overflowing the banks.

Alex. Bennett, a young man of 14, was caught by an electric street car accident, Cal., on Tuesday and died on Wednesday.

A party of New York residents, who are returning from Colorado, Col., were driving in their automobile on a rocky mountain road, when they met a team of mules. One of the mules was given up at once, but the other continued on, pulling the team over the rocky mountain road.

Patrick Doyle, a miner, 30 years old, committed suicide at Jerome, Arizona, Thursday week by taking poison. The same day, 18 miners of the town, a native woman named Mary McAllister, committed suicide by shooting herself in the head with a pistol.

It was discovered last Friday, the 6th, Frenchman man was badly badly wounded in his left arm, together with a Miss McDonald, who was said, however, to be in good condition. The woman had been shot in the shoulder, instead of the arm, the bullet being driven by the woman's gun.

Henry, a young man employed at the Parker River mine, near Lewiston, Idaho, was drowned Tuesday night in the Trinity River. He was crossing the river to the boat and was washed ashore. He was unable to get out of the water, although he had been swimming for 15 minutes. Henry was a tall Frenchman boy, aged about 17 years.

The annual convention of the American Society of Civil Engineers will be held in the Academy of Sciences building, San Francisco, during the week commencing Monday, June 23rd, 1896. At least 1000 engineers will be present, attending the meeting, and it is expected that there will probably be accompanied by their wives and families. The various engineers will arrive on a general train on Sunday evening, June 22nd.

Simon Deacon was brought to the Ogallala city jail, Tuesday, charged with mail-stealing. Deacon had wandered about the city for several days, eating, seeking work, and suffering the pangs of hunger. Tuesday night, when he asked where he could get a meal, he was told that there was none available. Deacon was positively free to go to bed, and regular train to Ogallala.
