THERE MUCT BE

Congress is Rushing Headlong to An \$80,000,000 Deficit and A Passive Bond Issue.

LITTLEFIELD POINTS THIS OUT.

Part of Increased Expenditures is Due To Enormous Military Establishment.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 19 .-- Congress is rushing headlong and blind to an \$80,000,000 deficit and a possible bond issue. This was pointed out on the floor of the house last week in a remarkable speech by Representative Littlefield of Maine

Total ... \$49,364,773.10 Following the custom which Mr. Lit-Following the custom which Mr. Littlefield has pursued during the debate on every other appropriation bill during the present session, in speaking on the naval bill he called the attention of the house and country to the fact that there must be a retrenchment at once or a provision for more revenue, or possibly a bond issue, for which he would never vote. He said that from estimates furnished to him he had figured out that at the rate Congress was now appropriating money the excess of exappropriating money the excess of expenditures over receipts at the end of the year would be between \$80,000,000 and \$90,000,000.

A large part of the increase of ex-penditures, he said, was due to the enormous military establishment of the country. While the increase of expenses in other departments in the last eight years over the previous eight years had been only 22 per cent, the increase for the army and navy had been 341 per In money it amounted to \$988,-

"I shall probably vote for the army and navy appropriation bills," said he. "They are undoubtedly necessary, but I wish to inquire of the house and its committees if it is wise to incur these expenditures when the rivers and harbors of the country and public buildings, the real monuments of peace, must suffer. We spend millions upon millions for a navy and nothing for the merchant marine, which might be the basis of the naval establishment. What boots it to carry the American flag at the masthead of a battleship into foreign ports if the flag of American commerce cannot go with it?"

Mr. Lattlefield then pointed out that these enormous expenditures must stop or more revenue be provided. He asked the house which of three methods it proposed to adopt in order to produce this revenue—a lower tariff to increase importations, a duty on articles that are now imported free, or an increase in internal revenue faxation.

According to Mrs. Stanford's friends, the facts of the case are that, about seven weeks ago, Mrs. Stanford one morning drank a glass of mineral water, which nauseated her for a few moments, and on the advice of friends she had the water analyzed, but without sensational results. which, after a day's investigation, satisfied her that no attempt had been
made to injure her, and the affair was
finally told to her friends as a joke.

"The report that Mrs. Stanford left for the orient because of an attempt at poisoning is entirely unfounded. She did however, tell me a month ago that she had been served with a bottle of mineral water which had a peculiar taste, but she did not drink it.
