LOCAL BRIEFS.

W. P. Hanna of Vernal has filed application with the state engineer for three second feet of water from the Green river in Wasatch county, with which to irrigate 160 acres.

A new and improved concrete mixer and boiler were received yesterday for Contractor P. J. Moran, and taken this afternoon up to the scene of paving operations at the east end of South Temple street.

Prof. Levi E. Young of the history department of the University of Utah, has gone to Emery county, where he will deliver three lectures on methods of teaching history. He will return in time to meet his classes Monday.

The Brewster Draymen's union entered the stores of the city under the aegis of the Federation of Labor hall, in return for hospitable courtesies extended by the latter previously. The occasion proved to be a very pleasant one.

New cement sidewalks are being rapidly laid on First street, dead telephone wires are disappearing from the business section of the city and next week the removal of the poles from the center of east South Temple street will begin.

Mrs. John G. Curtis, who was examined before Judge Armstrong yesterday afternoon as to her sanity, has been ordered turned over to the custody of her sister and so long as she remains in a normal frame of mind she will not be committed to the mental hospital.

A tourist riding on the Seeling Salt Lake car looked out too far yesterday on South Temple street near the University club, and being struck by a street was thrown into the roadway, and against one of the wheels of the car and the fender. The latter, however, saved him.

Assistant Engineer George M. Bacon took a trip to Big Cottonwood yesterday and upon his return stated that the work of laying concrete in the conduit was commenced yesterday morning. There are 35 men laying concrete and the work will be pushed ahead until bad weather sets in.

Enver James Beckwith of the Salvation Army at Denver, has been transferred to the post in this city, to assist the local corps. He says the Army is successfully pulling out of the financial hole into which it got during the opening of the new house of refuge on Commercial avenue, and all indebtedness is being cleared up.

There are 40 men working on the new country club grounds, and Architect Hale is preparing sketches of elevations for the club house of the Spanish Renaissance, and they are far enough along to show that it will be a very attractive one. It is claimed that the golf grounds of the club will be one of the best in the United States, as the topography is ideal, and there is water in plenty just where it is wanted.

Surveyor W. D. Boy of the Reclamation survey, has returned from the Strawberry Valley, where he says the mercury now falls to 22 below zero, and where keeping warm is something of a problem. However, the engineers manage to do so with the aid of a Sibby stove, good tentage and plenty of blankets. But it required five blankets the other night, to keep the cold out. The men are setting concrete monuments along the line of the tunnel under the divide.

In the case of Albert Fisher against S. V. Trent, which was concluded in Judge Lewis court yesterday, the jury returned a verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$100. The action was brought to recover \$250 as damages for the failure of defendant to properly install a boiler for plaintiff. It was claimed by plaintiff that he paid out \$150 in repairs on this boiler and that he was damaged in the sum of \$100 by being deprived of the use of the boiler while it was being repaired, making his total damages \$250. The jury cut that amount half in two in its verdict.

FRANK CANNON IN ROLE OF MARTYR.

Ex-Senator Guarded by Detectives
Against Assaults of "Mormon"
Fanatics.

STORY OF ALLEGED MOBBIING.

Matter Investigated and Found to Have
Been Manufactured Purely for
Political Effect.

The following press dispatch from New Haven, Conn., is worth reading: "Former United States Senator Frank Cannon of Utah, who is speaking in the east against Mormonism, is guarded by two stalwart young detectives against Mormon fanatics."

Appropos of the above and as evidence of the tactics pursued to arouse sympathy and pose as a martyr to the cause of "Americanism," Smith D. Fry, one of the best known newspaper correspondents in Washington, D. C., sends the following to the "News":

STORY OF MOBBIING.
Washington, Oct. 21.—Under the caption, "Mobbied by Mormons," quite a number of newspapers have printed dispatches from Philadelphia saying that former Senator Frank Cannon had been mobbed by "Mormons" after his lecture in that city.

Not merely as a newspaper man, but as a long time personal friend of Senator Cannon, the writer visited Philadelphia and made inquiry of the best posted newspaper workers in this city, and they all say that there is no truth in the story. There was no violence shown, none threatened, and none intended.

At the conclusion of the lecture, several very pertinent questions were asked by people in the audience. That is liable to happen at the conclusion of any lecture, and is not unusual as to the removal of the poles from the center of east South Temple street will begin.
