

# AFTER STREAMS OF THE STATE.

Applications for Irrigating Water Being Numerously Filed With Engineer Tanner.

## TO RECLAIM MUCH LAND.

Dams to be Built and Water to Be Diverted Into Canals and Irrigating Ditches—The Applicants.

Applications for water continue to flow into the state engineer's office thick and fast. Among those who have made filings is James H. Mease of Vernal, who asks for 30 second-feet to be taken from east of Rock creek, in Wasatch county, diverting channel to begin at a point near quarter section corner between sections 12 and 13, township 4 south, range 5 west, Uintah meridian. The channel is to be 30 feet wide, 6 feet deep and 20 miles long. Water to be used for irrigating 500 acres in township 4 south, range 5 west, townships 1 and 2, township 2 south, range 2 west, 20 second-feet to be diverted from Rock creek to be diverted at a point west of corner of sections 15, 16, 17, 18 of township 2, range 5 west, Canal to be 15 miles long and to cover 500 acres in township 2 south, range 5 west, township 1, range 2 west, 20 second-feet, range 2 west. Applicant states that he desires to secure his water for the settlers on these lands.

Herbert D. Page of Salt Lake makes application for 46000 acres, for which he is to pay \$100 per acre for application, or for 200 second-feet from Rock creek to be diverted at a point west of corner of sections 15, 16, 17, 18 of township 2, range 5 west, Canal to be 15 miles long and to cover 500 acres in township 2 south, range 5 west, township 1, range 2 west, 20 second-feet, range 2 west. Application states that he desires to secure his water for the settlers on these lands.

## LAND SELECTIONS RECENTLY MADE.

Pieces Chosen Cover Wide Area And Many Persons Included In the List

## ARE FROM SEVERAL COUNTIES.

In general, however, the amount was ample to revive vegetation and the range, in many localities, especially in the north, the rainfall was ample to revive vegetation and the range, but in many cases, especially in the south, the rainfall was negligible.

Temperatures were decidedly above the normal, the disagreeable effects of which were accentuated by the prevailing sultriness of the atmosphere.

The harvesting of grain was completed in most districts, and in the remainder was nearing completion, with threshing work well along.

This work was, however, retarded to some extent by the frequent storms.

Days were, in general, not so advanced, and in many localities still await the reaper. Some slight damage to the grain was reported from the high winds, but this was of such frequent occurrence that it was difficult to determine what was really due to the weather, and this portion of the crop will undoubtedly fall short of the average.

The third crop of alfalfa, as well as sugar beets, were greatly benefited by the rains.

The beet crop was, in general, in good condition, though suffering from locusts from flight. Late corn was, however, not up to the average, owing to the long-continued drought, the yield offered by the moisture of the past week having been delayed too long.

Corn is in very good condition generally, although infected in many districts by the central counties are warm.

Soil was in excellent condition throughout, but only by drought, but also by the passage of grasshoppers. The range was, to a great extent, received by the showers in districts where rainfall was sufficient, but in the localities not favored by rain, condition was very poor, and in such places it was necessary to feed stock. Plowing of hill land was begun in some localities.

## HOMER'S HAMMER.

It Knocks to Have Franchise Vacated—Order to Show Cause.

The complaint in the injunction suit brought by Thomas Homer against Salt Lake City and the Utah Light & Railway company, which was published in full in last evening's "News," was filed in the district court late yesterday afternoon. Judge Armstrong issued an order to show cause why an injunction should not be granted against the corporation and against before Judge Morris on Monday, Sept. 11. The plaintiff seeks to have the court declare null and void the franchise recently granted by the city council to the Utah Light & Railway company and to have the company enjoined from operating under the franchise or transferring its land in Big Cottonwood to the city in exchange for the franchise.

## WATER FOR MURRAY.

J. P. Cahoon Granted Franchise to Install System at Once.

At its meeting last night the city council of Murray passed an ordinance granting J. P. Cahoon permission to construct water pressure of 10 pounds and charge city. Mr. Cahoon proposes to furnish a water pressure of 10 pounds and charge rates equivalent to those now charged in Salt Lake.

The franchise provides that the city shall pay \$1000 per year to the franchisee and the franchisee shall furnish water and fire hydrants. At any time during the 50 years term of the franchisee of Murray may purchase from the grantee or his successors the water system at a sum equivalent to cost and reasonable interest.

Work on the project is to begin at once.

Sanford, representing the plaintiffs, Henry W. Gayler and Hannah Gayler. It is alleged that the defendants used fraud and force to be due from plaintiffs to Dr. Gardner for medical services and an injunction is asked to restrain defendants from making any further attempt to collect the judgment rendered against the plaintiffs in this action by Justice McNamee, Aug. 24, 1904, for the total sum of \$12,000 and interest at 14.20 cents.

The complainant alleges in the first place that the action against Mr. and Mrs. Gayler was filed in Justice McNamee's court in Murray while neither the plaintiff nor defendants are residents of that place, and that the defendant is not a resident of Murray, and that it is at this time in the city and not in Murray, hence that court had no jurisdiction in the matter at all.

It is further alleged that there was no service of the summons, personal or otherwise, upon the defendants that preceded the filing of the action, and that the entry of judgment upon such a return was accordingly fraudulent.

Finally it is alleged that the services rendered by Dr. Gardner were for the married son of Mr. and Mrs. Gayler, who afterwards died, and not for them at all, at least not before the time of the filing of the action against the estate of the son. An abstract of the judgment in the case has been filed in the district court and plaintiffs ask that a restraining order be issued to restrain defendants from attempting to collect the judgment. Judge Armstrong issued a temporary restraining order on the court, and made it permanent before Judge Moton.
