> > LONDON, 10,-Gladstone has aunounced in the Commons the postponement of the Queen's departure for Balmoral, in deference to public business; the time for the prorogation is the re-

fore uncertain. In the Lords the Marquis of Ripon made a fong argument in favor of the ballot, referred to his experience in the United States in the most pleasant terms, and paid a compliment to American institutions. Earl Shaftesbury made a demand for two month's time for a discussion of the ballot, and a vigorous debate ensued, participated in by the Lord Chancellor and various others Finally the house divided and rejected the motion, the majority against the government being 48.
