

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

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Home Mission.—Elders of the Home Mission of this State will visit the country wards to-morrow.

Mill Burned.—Yesterday, the Baltic five-story mill, at Ophir, was totally destroyed by fire. The origin of the fire is not known. The mill was the property of the Cleveland Silver Mining Company.

Ladies' Conference.—Sisters M. Isabella Horne and Helen M. Whitney went to Grantsville this morning to attend the ladies' conference of the Ophir Stake, which will be held to-day and to-morrow. They will return in all probability on Monday.

Many sheep-owners are making arrangements to take care of sheep at home, feeding them on roots and lucern. He thinks the days of beef raised on the ranges are gone by, and that stall-fed and pastured cattle will take their place. The ranges are limited, and the latter plan is a better protection against thieves. And he is about right, too.
